LUMBER MARKET REPORT BETTER

SEATTLE, June 9. (AP)—The only thing lacking to make a strong lumber market is consumption, the West Coast Lumbermen's association said today in announcing today that current sales of 180 mills in district for the week ending June 3 were \$1.39 per cent over production. Shipments were 19.22 per cent over production.

"The buying movement," the association reiterated, "is held by the industry to be by dealers and wholesalers anticipating price advances, and not for consumption—and so speculative."

Production of \$2,815,943 board feet of lumber for the week was reported by 252 down and operating mills, an increase of .76 per cent over the previous week.

Case of Mexican Re-submitted at Request of Judge

Other jury trials are being set for the June term of court, beginning June 19, when the new jury panel is scheduled to report for duty.

time record for a June 8—and then began to recede, with a drop of ten degrees promised for today.

Dozens of persons were overcome and treated in Chicago hospitals, including eight visitors to the city's Century of Progress Exposition.

Cleveland scorched

Cleveland was scorched under an all-time heat record of 95 for the day and reported that eleven were known to have died in Ohio during the past two days from the heat, with two others losing their lives by drowning.

Detroit likewise tried to keep cool but couldn't as the mercury went to a record-breaking June 8 figure of 100. Eight dead from the heat were counted in the Michigan metropolises and two were drowned.

Drownings were common throughout the affected sections as residents took to the streams and beaches. Indiana listed four drownings; Kentucky five, Wisconsin four; Baltimore one. In addition Indiana reported eight dead from the heat itself.

Nudists Active

The heat belt extended all the way from the Rocky Mountains to the Atlantic seaboard and the sunny south had its share. Nashville, Tenn., and Atlanta, Ga., reporting one dead each, with no immediate relief in sight. New England was blistered with temperatures that ranged from 90 to 93, with Boston baking under the higher figure, a June 8 record for this point.

But despite the heat wave 10,000 Chicago violet ray fans signed petitions to the Lincoln Park board asking an enclosure for nude sun bathing. The proposal would call for a stockade in which men could bask on the sun for a period and then be followed by women.

The board is thinking it over.

Dry's Battle

Though undoubtedly outnumbered in the fight over repeal, the drys expect to make up for lack of numbers by a bitter battle in the field and an attempt to discredit the election if a majority of wets are elected.

This movement is seen in the present controversy between F. C. Heffron, dry of Eugene, and the secretary of state and attorney general. Heffron fired the first gun by refusing to sign the pledge on the filing application, which asks each candidate to promise to vote as his county goes.

Heffron declared this was unconstitutional and scratched out the paragraph. State officials have twice denied his petition. Heffron, a lawyer, may throw the matter into the courts.
