FIRST FIRES OF SEASON START

ALTURAS, Calif.—The first forest fires of the season on the Modoc national forest occurred almost simultaneously a few days ago when a brush fire broke out in the Hayden Hill section followed by a fire in the vicinity of Ballard's reservoir, a few miles south of Canby. No damage to timber was done by either fire and both were brought under control after burning over a total of four acres each.

It is believed that a sheepherder was responsible for starting the fire under Hayden Hill while the Ballard's reservoir fire was started, it is thought, by loggers employed on nearby private timber holdings.
