WEATHER AGAIN
AFFECTS WHEAT

CHICAGO, June 9. (AP)—Sensational reports of extraordinary deterioration of the oats crop because of abnormal temperatures brought about a decidedly active and higher market for all grains today.

A return of intense heat in the southwest, with no indications of moisture relief, was a late bulging factor as to wheat. All deliveries of oats sold at the highest prices since 1931.

Wheat and oats closed strong, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 above yesterday's finish; corn, 1 1/2 to 2c up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1/2c.

NEW YORK, June 9. (AP)—A sharp spurt in grains and further weakness of the American dollar in foreign exchange markets apparently furnished a welcome lift to a lagging stock market today, and leading equities replaced early losses with gains of fractions to 2 or more points. The close was firm. Approximately 5,000,000 shares changed hands.

Rallying tendencies developed before the final hour, when farm machine issues leaped into the limelight, and wheat, corn and oats and cotton moved to higher levels.

Case threshing gained around 9 points. Other stocks with gains of 1 to more than 2 points included International Harvester, Advance Rumely, Sears Roebuck and Caterpillar Tractor. Gains of around 1 to more than 2 points were recorded by American Tobacco, Liggett & Myers, Reynolds B. Lorillard, American Telephone, Consolidated Gas, Consolidated oil, American Water Works, Standard Oil of New Jersey and National Steel. Postal Telegraph preferred lost about 7 points, following defeat of the amendment to the railroad bill which would have permitted the companies to merge.
