

FRISBIE WINS OVER DEMETRAL

Medford Heavy Tumbles Seattle Man Out Of Ring

The black, curly and exceedingly hard head of young Ray Frisbie totally ruined the attack and tore down the defense of Harry Demetral, a bullet-headed Greek, from Seattle, in the main event wrestling match at the Legion hall Friday night.

Frisbie, losing the first fall after 17 minutes of vicious wrestling, wrecked the hopes of the middle-aged but powerful foreigner in just 20 seconds after the start of the second period. Demetral, hurled from the ring by a series of powerful head butts, was still in a sick condition at the end of the five-minute rest. He had been counted out as he lay on the floor outside the ring and even an extension of the normal period between falls failed to revive him.

Demetral Wins First

The Seattle man, broad and unburned, captured the first fall with an Indian deadlock. The hold was placed so effectively on Frisbie's head he was forced to quit. Frisbie opened the second fall with a flying butt. He missed the first one and came back with five more. The final one, directed at Demetral's stomach, knocked him completely over the ropes.

The preliminary was equally as sensational as the main event. Pete Belcastro, thoroughly disliked by the audience and saved from defeat by the bell, won from Herman Olson of Seattle. Belcastro took the only fall with a body scissors after he had weakened Olson with rabbit punches. The end came in 16 minutes.

Both men were in and out of the ring throughout the bout and feet and knees were used in illegal fashion. Roland Warren was continually warning the men and pulling them off the ropes.

Olson was a strong favorite with the crowd and drew applause each time he attempted to retaliate to Belcastro's tactics. Belcastro was nearly gone in a body scissors when the half-hour limit was over.

Philadelphia fans figuratively shedding tears over the failure of Jimmie Foxx to live up to the crowd boasts he made for him when he clouted 55 home runs last season, apparently can dry their eyes and start cheering him on toward record achievements once more.

With the redoubtable Lefty Gomez as his mound opponent, Foxx crashed three home runs, batted in five tallies and was a leading figure in the 19-hit attack that gave the Athletics their first victory of the season over the Yankees, 14 to 11.

For a while, Foxx was tied with Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig for the big league home run lead with 11, but after the A's had put the game away with a six run rally in the eighth, the Babe reasserted his supremacy by pasting his twelfth.

Salem Prepares To Fight Plan To Move Tournament

SALEM, June 9, (AP)—The Salem chamber of commerce, backed by virtually every civic organization in town, has launched a campaign to inform the people of Oregon of the origin and magnitude of the state high school basketball tournament. Its removal from Salem to Eugene and Corvallis has been threatened.

It was reported here that Corvallis business men, informed that the tournament expense runs above \$1500 each year, immediately said "that settles it." Willamette university developed the state tournament as an invitational fray, and has joined in protest against its proposed removal.

The Statesman said today: "Developments Thursday revealed that despite all denials, the high school athletic association board of control initiated the plan to move the tournament, and that certain alumni of the state university and college were involved, and some few students, prominent among them Richard Neuberger, editor of the Oregon Emerald, university student newspaper.
