"The Aftermath" will be presented at the Klamath Temple, Friday night, June 16, at 8 p. m. and at the union Sunday evening meeting at the Methodist Episcopal church, June 18th, at 8 p. m. It is a two-character religious, temperance drama-debate, dealing with present conditions. Characters are Tom O'Neil, in the liquor business, and Judge Wood, judge of the Superior court. Scene: The judge's chambers.

drunken driver was killed. Tom enters in quest of a license for his new drink emporium. The judge and O'Neil discuss joyfully the wet victory of the recent election. The conversation finally leads up to the automobile accident as reported in the newspaper, and of which O'Neil was the only eye witness. What takes place from there on has gone down in prohibition history as the most complete, dramatic, humorous, pathetic, colorful and cynical presentation of the liquor problem ever presented on the American platform.

When an underworld big shot decides to turn gentleman, give up rum-running for tea dances, exchange his machine guns for books on philosophy and expensive etchings, trade in his limousine for polo ponies; when he begins to talk with a broad A, lapsing into a bit of French now and then—when, in short, he makes up his mind to "muscle in" on society and be a millionaire among the millionaires, the result is likely to be hilariously funny.

It would be funny, even in real life. But when the gangster turns out to be Edward G. Robinson, as he does in his latest First National picture, "The Little Giant," which comes to the Pelican theatre today, you can settle back in your seat to follow his adventures with the prospect of an amusing hour ahead.

PINE TREE

I commend to your attention one of the grandest talking pictures anyone of us is ever likely to see. In the past four years we have had a number of outstanding talking pictures, but none is the same class with "The Mine Tonight," now at the Pine Tree theatre.

In the first place, "Be Mine Tonight" is a film and not a photographed stage play. It has thrown off the shackles of the studio and escaped into the open air. It presents an evenly flowing continuity of swift motion against richly varied and really magnificent scenery. A picture should be a panorama. "Be Mine Tonight" is a panorama of Alpine settings of exquisite beauty, perfectly photographed and flawlessly knit together in dramatic sequence. Then the basis of this drama is joyful adventure, tender romance, great and glorious fun.

Described as a glittering panorama of New York life from Battery Park to Harlem, "Made on Broadway" comes to the Vox theatre starting today with Robert Montgomery and Sally Eilers, two of the screen's most popular younger players, co-starring for the first time.

Montgomery is said to have another high-speed comedy role as Jeff Bidwell, super-fixer, "wise guy" and debonaire gambler who hoodwinks society and reaps a harvest on Broadway. LOSSES IN CROPS ADVANCE GRAINS

CHICAGO, June 10. (AP)—Seasonal crop losses shown in the government report vied with new damage today from severe heat, and hoisted wheat and oat prices to fresh top figures for 1933. All grain markets were big, broad affairs, with general public trading much larger than of late. There were advices of wheat firing today in Illinois and the Ohio valley. These areas have heretofore been regarded as in the best condition of any in the country.

Wheat closed strong at virtually the day's top point, 1 1/2c to 1 1/4c above yesterday's finish; oats, 1c to 1 1/2c up; corn, 1c to 1 1/2c advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 7c.

NEW YORK, June 10. (AP)—The stock market shuffled through its brief session today without any great amount of enthusiasm. Profit taking flurries in some categories tended to balance further rising tendencies in others, and the close was moderately irregular. Trading volume dwindled with transactions approximately 2,500,000 shares.

A satisfactory freight car loading report and optimistic implications of U. S. Steel's backlog figures were about in line with expectations.

The dollar again weakened in foreign exchange markets. Various industrial issues were inclined to sag, but a number of the utilities found followings. Among the latter up fractions to around 2 points were Consolidated Gas and North America. Slightly higher prices were also recorded by Owens-Illinois, Chrysler, Standard Oil of New Jersey, Montgomery Ward and some others.

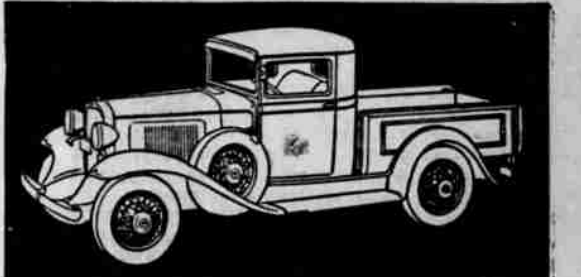
Dorris, Calif. Adjutant Ford of the local corps will speak both morning and evening at the Dorris church.
