AMERICAN PROGRAM LONDON, June 12. (AP)—

An exposition of the American viewpoint shortly before the world economic conference opened today gave four specific ways for attacking high tariffs, and expressed "faith that some progress will be made of a reasonably satisfactory nature." The specific tariff proposals Mr. Hull said the conference might consider are: First, general revision simultaneously through various governments and parliaments. Second, a small horizontal reduction as a preliminary step. Third, regional agreements between neighbor nations, such as that in effect between Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg. Fourth, purely bilateral tariff bargaining.

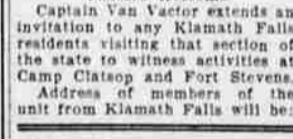
Klamath Falls Has Year's Hottest Day

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anxiously tonight as a broad expanse of muddy flood waters poured down the Columbia and its tributaries, inundating everything in its path. Ranch houses, airports, highways, and rich garden lands lay under water as high waters swept aside dikes and hastily-constructed sandbag walls. The Willamette river reached 24.7 feet tonight, highest summer record since 1894. Further rise was predicted as temperatures soared to 91 here today.

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
