### Climbing Missions Beat Portland in Five Contests.

Manager Fred Hoffmann's Missions had won back their role of Coast League trouble-maker today after battering Portland in five out of seven games last week and shoving the champions from first down to third place.

Incidentally, the Red moved back into the first division, showing unexpected mound strength and their usual punch at the plate, the Missions won the second half of Saturday's double-header, 5-7, after losing the opener, 5-7, and then captured both ends of Sunday's twin bill, 3-4 and 4-3.

### Babich Checks Portland

Reported ill Saturday, Johnny Babich was well enough yesterday to check repeated Portland threats and mark up his tenth triumph of the year and his seventh in a row in the opener. The Reds needed only 11 hits for their 5 runs, but two of them were four-baggers by Bill Walters and Oscar Eckhardt. Lloyd Johnson had a little better of Lou Koupal, Portland hurling star, in the 7-inning second game.

Despite the loss of two out of three week-end games, Hollywood held onto its first place berth and won the series from Seattle, 4-3. The Indians walked the Stars, 11-4, Saturday and outlasted them in Sunday's 13-inning opener, 3-7. The Stars captured the short nightcap, 1-0, when Martin homered in the fifth.

Sacramento moved up to within two points of the Stars by taking Saturday's game from Los Angeles, 9-7, and the morning game Sunday, 2-1. The Angels came back in the afternoon to win, 6-1, behind Fay Thomas' 3-hit tossing. Sacramento captured the series, 4-3.

San Francisco and Oakland completed their series with three victories apiece, the morning game ending in a 9-9 tie after 10 innings. After dropping a wild slugfest Saturday, 16-11, the Seals evened the series Sunday afternoon, 10-6.

## WHEAT ADVANCES ON CHICAGO MART

CHICAGO, June 12. (AP)—Wheat advanced late today, responsive largely to an upward swing of securities.

Speculative demand for wheat came about also as a reflection of unfavorable crop reports from the United States winter wheat belt, especially indications of premature ripening in soft wheat areas east of the Mississippi river.

New wheat has started to move in volume in the Southwest, with 20c cars received today at interior terminals in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas.

All deliveries of wheat mounted to new high records, and closed strong at the topmost point attained, 1c to 1 1/2c above Saturday's finish: corn, unchanged to 1c up; oats, 1c to 1 1/2c advanced, and provisions unchanged to 5c off.

## Christian Science

## Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 12. (AP)—Early hesitancy in the stock market today was succeeded by another rush for equities which carried prices up 1 to 3 or more points, with trading volume greatly accelerated. Utilities and 1-balls were in the van of the forward rush, with the industrial not far behind. The close was strong. Transfers approximated 3,500,000 shares.

American Telephone ran considerably ahead of the general market, with a gain of around 1 point to a new high for the year. Net gains in freight car traffic spurred the carriers to further buoyancy, while various utilities responded to reports of greatly enhanced earnings. Commodities were narrowly irregular.

Gains of 1 to around 3 points were held by Consolidated Gas, North American, International Telephone, Western Union, Public Service of New Jersey, United Corporation and Columbia Gas, Case and National Distillers were up about 3 and 4 points, respectively, while advances of around 1 to 3 or more were registered by U. S. Steel, American Can, Dupont National Bicent, Allied Chemical, Santa Fe, Union Pacific, Chesapeake & Ohio, Delaware & Hudson, U. S. Industrial Alcohol, Johns Manville, Chrysler, National Cash Register, Standard Oil of New Jersey and New York Central.

# TED FIO-RITO TO PLAY WEDNESDAY

America's famous song writer and orchestra director, Ted Fio-Rito, who has nearly 100 popular song hits to his credit, comes in person with his famous orchestra to play Wednesday evening, June 14, at the Pelican theatre, through arrangements by H. W. Poole.

Born of musical parents in Newark, N. J., hardly more than 20 years ago, Ted Fio-Rito has worked with the music within him and brought it out on paper, on the piano, and in the direction of his orchestra. Today, as one of America's greatest song writers, Ted aspires to write a symphony, and in his spare time studies with that objective in view.

His first song, a hit number called "Love Bird," was published when he was 19 years old. One year later the youthful pianist formed his own orchestra, playing first at the Oriole Terrace in Detroit and later at the Edgewater Beach hotel in Chicago, where the

band made musical history. Since the Chicago engagement, Ted Fio-Rito's name has become known from coast to coast, and today his orchestra is one of Music Corporation of America's ace attractions.

About a year ago Fio-Rito's music was first introduced to the Pacific coast and within a few weeks' time he became the favorite band of movie-land. The rest is history. Ted moved from Los Angeles to San Francisco and became an overnight sensation at the smart Hotel St. Francis. During his long stay at the St. Francis the band was heard nightly over the Pacific coast chain of the Columbia network and many times was featured on NBC network commercial programs including the M. J. B. coffee program and the famous "Magic Carpet" hour. Ted and his orchestra are making a limited personal appearance tour before returning to the Hotel St. Francis for the orchestra's second season.
