

GUILD PLAY WELL RECEIVED TUESDAY

Eleven popular young folks of Klamath Falls played character roles in a three-act play, "Captain Applejohn," presented by the Little Theatre Guild at the Klamath Union high school auditorium, Tuesday evening.

An appreciative audience saw the first big production of the theatre guild carried through to home talent perfection. The theme was around a middle-aged Englishman, Applejohn, played by Don F. Hamilton, who saw old age creeping over him before he had tagged the life he dreamed of. His ancestors lived.

His desire to sell the inherited mansion to permit an adventurous life and the scheme promoted by a smooth reality man was the setting for the second act, a dream, and the realization of false pretenses in the third act.

BOISE, Idaho, June 13. (AP)—Flight Lieutenants George B. Hallett and Whitney Close of the 116th observation squadron from Peets Field, Spokane, Wash., were killed here today, crashed in the wreckage of their planes which crashed during maneuvers with the Idaho national guard.

ARMY OF WORKERS BUSY NEAR HERE

Tillamook county, and a number from the smaller communities of Oregon.

The list of officers includes Captain W. A. Wapenstien, First Lieutenant of Field Artillery Reserve R. Under; the camp doctor, Lieutenant Junior Grade James Sayres of the U. S. Navy; Detail Sergeant Kilpatrick; Mess Sergeant Bernard T. Euler; Assistant Mess Sergeant Charles Miller; Supply Sergeant Oscar W. Spaulding.

The men are working seven and one-half hours a day, five days a week. The work hours are from 8 to 11:30 a. m. and from 1 to 5 p. m. The men do not work on Saturdays or Sundays. Those days have been set aside for visitors' days. All people who wish to visit the camp will be welcome. The recreation room will be furnished for visitors to eat lunches in. Meals may be purchased from the camp for 25 cents each.

Friday was the opening day of the camp canteen, where tobacco, cigarettes, postage stamps, and candy can be purchased. The canteen stock is incomplete, but will be added to as fast as supplies are trucked in. The stock is purchased wholesale and sold to the men for city prices. The proceeds will be used to furnish the recreation room with reading material. The room will be furnished with a variety of novels, forestry books and newspapers from the various home towns represented by the occupants of the camp. A travelling, all-fiction library will travel from camp to camp, staying one month at each. Captain Wapenstien is trying to secure a piano for a recreation hall. Writing tables will also be constructed and installed.

For recreational purposes and for those with pugilistic tendencies, a boxing ring is under construction.

According to Captain Wapenstien the plans for the near future include the installation of a short wave sending and receiving set. A search is being made among the occupants of the camp for a licensed radio operator.

The men are busy building and improving roads from Lapine and Silver Lake to the camp, working on telephone lines from the nearby towns, and installing a pipe line from Silver Creek to the camp kitchen.

Ground is being cleared for the construction of a mess hall, 30 feet wide and 150 feet long. The food will be placed on the tables for the men. At present the men's mess kits are being filled as they file past the kitchen and the men eat on board tables and benches under a canvas roof.

A 400 gallon hot water boiler to be used in the installation of a bath house containing 15 shower heads is expected to arrive at the camp soon, according to Captain Wapenstien.

PORTLAND, June 13. (AP)—Several selections of acting postmasters in the first congressional district, recommended by Rep. Pierce and local organizations, have been approved, according to a special dispatch to the Journal today.

PLANS COMPLETED FOR VALLEY ROAD

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—Plans have just been completed whereby Falsley and the Chewaucan valley will be directly connected with the Yellowstone cut-off. The road will be of the desert type and will join the Lakeview-Burns highway a short distance south of the Plush road. This new road will also serve to connect Falsley with the north Warner valley.

The route will follow the present road from Falsley east to San Hollow, surmount the rim then directly to the KL ranch at the head of Albert lake. It is planned to use the road to Sand Hollow and that from the KL ranch eastward, thus leaving 14 miles for new construction.

The regular county crew will be employed and it is thought that the new grade as well as some improvements on the Falsley and Albert lake connections will be completed by July 1. This new road will bolster the request of Harney and Lake counties for a fish hatchery at Ana river and it will make it possible to truck fish throughout Harney county at a large saving in mileage over the present hatcheries.

United States Men Walk Out of Debt Battle in London

Yesterday's discussions somewhat to the dismay of the United States representatives was thrust formally into the proceedings today.

Only twice during the entire day of speeches of 19 chief delegates from other nations did a representative from the United States appear. During the afternoon, Ralph W. Morrison, of Texas, walked in and sat down for a while. He heard speakers again declare settlement of the delicate war debt issue vital to world recovery. During the morning, Ray Atherton, counselor in the United States embassy, strolled in now and then, standing before the rostrum listening to the speeches, apparently on behalf of Secretary Hull.

The secretary of state's absence, however, technically had been announced that he would not deliver his speech to the conference until tomorrow.

At Hull's office it was explained he had deferred his speech until tomorrow in order to make several changes, which it was believed were unimportant. It was believed, however, that he had received last minute instructions from President Roosevelt, after injection of war debts into the conference at the outset by Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald, of Great Britain, yesterday.
