

BEAVERS OPEN WITH ANGELS

Ducks in Fighting Mood to Regain Top Place in Coast Loop.

Hollywood's Stars take the field at Oakland Tuesday with high hopes of bettering their first place position at the expense of the slipping Oaks, while their four closest rivals are fighting among themselves.

Sacramento, trailing Hollywood by a bare two points, faces the Missions on the Solon's home diamond. In view of their five triumphs over Portland last week, the Missions are scheduled to cause plenty of trouble at the California capital.

Abbott Clontarf, somewhat chastened by their five Mission bittings, the Portlands are expected to drive at Wrigley field this week. Manager Spencer Abbott thinks his veterans are going to top the 1933 pennant, and expects them to resume their winning drive with the Angels as the victims. Four defeats at Sacramento last week sent the Angels down to fifth place.

In the fourth league engagement, San Francisco crosses bats with Seattle again in their fight for seventh place. At Seattle two weeks ago each team won four games of the night played. Since then the Seals have been strengthened by the addition of Outfielder Funk, obtained from the Chicago White Sox.

Oscar Eckhardt, slugging Mission outfielder, continued to hold a commanding lead in the Pacific Coast league batting averages Tuesday, with a .443 total to his credit, 46 points ahead of his closest competitor.

And just to make the Mission club's place in the records doubly sure, Louie Almada, another outfielder, slipped into second place, hitting .397. This showed Larry Woodall, Sacramento, into third position, with .350.

Largely on the basis of the heavy stick work of Eckhardt and Almada, the Mission nine led the team averages with .324 in 70 games.

Ray Jacobs, Hollywood first baseman, added another circuit wallop to his list, giving him 23 4-ply hits as the home run king; seven more than George Burns, Seattle first baseman and manager.

Fred Haney, veteran Hollywood third baseman, and Aggie Galan, San Francisco shortstop, continued their close race for base theft honors, with 17 pilferings each.

HOWARD CONFIDENT OF BEATING O'DELL

Russell Howard, full of resentment of his position as an underdog against Tony O'Dell at Merrill Thursday night, entered into the final days of his training Tuesday determined to upset his rival in the ten round main event. This will be the first time Howard and O'Dell have ever opposed each other.

O'Dell, fighting at welter weight, will have a size advantage over Howard who has been in the ring heretofore as a lightweight. O'Dell, too, has had more experience and can punch more effectively than the cleverly boxing Howard.

Steamboat Jackson, establishing a list of knockout victories in Merrill semi-finals, will face a young, rugged negro, Romaine Street, for six rounds. Street has turned himself into an aggressive fighter and may halt Jackson's string of victories.

Three four-round preliminaries will go on before the two featured bouts.

"The 'Indian sign' the Cincinnati Reds hold on the champion Chicago Cubs is one of baseball's minor mysteries, but whatever the reasons, the Reds are taking full advantage of it to remain within striking distance of a first division berth in the National league.

The Cubs can hold their own, at least, with any other outfit in the loop, but they roll over and play dead just about every time the Reds take the field against them. The two clubs have played nine games so far this season, and Cincinnati, picked as sure cellar finishers, has won seven of them. These victories have kept the Reds in a threatening position so that today, with an even break in 52 games, they are in fifth place, only a game behind the Cubs.

It was the same old story Monday, as Cincinnati rallied for four runs in the seventh, and upset Charley Grimm's club, 6-5. Chicago seemed to have the game cinched with a 5-2 lead at the end of six innings, but in the seventh, two passes, singles by Chick Hatfield and Joe Morrissey and George drove Pat Malone to the showers and gave the Reds the verdict.

BARNES REPORTS ON FISH STREAMS

After making his weekly visits to various fishing localities of the county, Marion Barnes, game warden, reported Tuesday that the Miller lake road was opened Monday; the Davis lake road was recently opened, and that limit catches are being made at Odell lake.

Several Klamath people caught their supply of fish at Odell Sunday. Jack Francy caught one of the largest lake trout ever hooked in the lake. Barnes reported. He also declared Sheriff L. L. Low caught his limits of trout and minnows along the lake shore. Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Logan and George Martin of San Francisco were others making the lake catch. Taken used at the lake with the greatest success is the small brown hackle.

Waters of Marsh creek are high and muddy, with fishing very poor. The water is over the banks of the creek. Sprague river and the Sycan are both too high for fishing, according to Hugo Leyva, game warden with the state police department stationed at Lakeview, who was in Klamath Falls, Tuesday. Practically all of the Lake county streams are too high for fishing, Leyva stated.

The road to Diamond lake is open to within one-half mile of the Crater Lake junction road. Barnes said. Deep snow drifts still remain for several miles near the lake, and are not expected to be cleared for a few days, although crews are reported to be at work.

Fly fishing in the Klamath river is still excellent. Barnes stated. Because of his size, Billy Sawchuck, 8 years old, made the unusual catch on the river Monday. In his first attempt at fishing he landed several hunky trout.
