

BIBLE STUDY PROGRESSES IN SCHOOL ROOMS

The annual meeting and election of officers of the board of week-day religious instruction in the public schools was held Monday evening in the parlors of the Presbyterian church, with the president, Rev. T. Davis Preston, presiding.

There were present Revs. W. T. S. Spriggs, Fred Hornshub, Arthur T. Bates, H. J. Lorenz, A. Theodore Smith, Mrs. E. L. Walsh, Mrs. B. Bergman, Mrs. W. T. The report of the treasurer showed a deficit of \$81 on the year's work. Plans were made at the meeting for taking care of this balance. Miss Dorothy Smith, the teacher for the year, presented her report of the year's work. The report stated that the work of religious instruction started in the seven grade schools of the city in the second week in September, and continued to the close of the school year.

The first semester enrollment was 309, the second semester, 333. Twelve classes a week were held in the first semester and 12 in the second.

The instruction during the first semester covered the subject of desirable Christian traits, during the second semester the life of Christ with a study of Palestine. The books of the Bible were studied by the fourth grade throughout the year, with the outstanding stories contained in them.

Notebooks of the work done were kept by the pupils of the fifth grade.

The committee on nominations under the chairmanship of Rev. A. Theodore Smith made the following nominations which were unanimously accepted by the board: President, Mr. E. W. Morrison; vice president, Mrs. C. G. Johnson; secretary, Mrs. D. M. Smith; treasurer, Mr. J. A. Leech. Rev. Smith commented on the work of the retiring officers during the past year, and proposed a rising vote of thanks be given. Rev. Preston, who retired from the presidency after two years in office, thanked the board for the vote of thanks and its support, and expressed his pleasure at securing the officers who were just elected.

He said he believed the work would go forward in a larger and more substantial way than ever. Miss Dorothy Smith was elected teacher for next school year, which starts in September. The secretary was instructed to send letters of appreciation to those who generously supported the work during the past year.

SPORTSMEN SEEK CHANGE IN DATES

The Klamath County Sportsmen's association sent a request to the state game department Tuesday following a meeting Monday evening, recommending a 15 day change in the migratory bird opening date of the county.

Other regulations concerning the bird laws of this section were recommended to be left as is. That the migratory season be opened October 1 instead of October 15 was the change asked. The association believed Oregon residents should be given as long a hunting season as California laws permit. Because of the season closing Dec. 15 and the latter part of the season being undesirable for hunting because of frozen waters the change in opening was asked. California season opens Oct. 15 and closes Jan. 1.

CRITIC PRAISES FIO-RITO BAND

Mr. J. L. Wallin, music critic of the Portland Oregon Journal, was asked to give his opinion of the Ted Fio-Rito Vaudeville presentation, which is a current attraction at a leading theatre in Portland, and will be featured in Klamath Falls, on Wednesday, June 14, at the Pelican Theatre, and later at the Altamont ballroom.

Wallin says, Ted Fio-Rito has refined American jazz to the point of real art without robbing it of one iota of its inimitable characteristics which perhaps better than anything express the temperament of the nation. This he is demonstrating with his St. Francis Hotel orchestra on his northwest tour which has been arranged by Cole McKelroy, Portland ballroom operator.

Jazz of this sort is music with revolutionary promises for more than passing consideration. It offers possibilities for development to degrees far beyond those we have obtained, through the media of tone colors and nuances. Fio-Rito impresses one as possessing a wealth of musical ideas and as a colorist par excellence. His band is not large and still with the limited material his continuous programs as rich in tints and colorful designs as one of the rarest of Oriental rugs.
