**FLOOD RECEDES.**  
PORTLAND, June 14. (AP)—The flood situation on the Columbia and Willamette rivers was improved today and the weatherman said there was no present cause for worry.

The Willamette at Portland fell one-tenth of a foot during the night, the first drop in many days. The Columbia was falling slightly at The Dalles, and although the Snake river rose somewhat at Lewiston yesterday, a recession took place today. The Willamette river continued to fall at Salem and Eugene.

Edward L. Wells, weather observer here, said "the rivers probably will fall very slightly for the next three days, and there are no worries for the present. It is not possible to determine the full effects of the hot spell over the interior."

# FATHER-IN-LAW FACES FEDERAL MURDER CHARGE

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his attentions to Beatrice Tupper who had been living apart from her husband, investigators discovered.

Josephine declared she saw her father stabbing Murdock after her husband had become intoxicated. Murdock had gone to sleep in an overstuffed chair when attacked by Tupper, Josephine said. When the attack took place, Josephine said she left for a neighbor's home and remained for the rest of the night, for fear her father would attack her because she had attempted to interfere.

When she returned Wednesday morning about 9 o'clock, she saw her husband dead in the chair where she saw the stabbing occur. She notified Indian officers at the Agency.

Beatrice Tupper Hurt. Beatrice Tupper was taken to the Indian reservation hospital after the investigation Wednesday morning. She was suffering from head lacerations received, she said, when Tupper returned to the home about daylight Wednesday.

"He dragged me from the bed and broke this chair over my head," she related, pointing to a broken and blood-stained kitchen chair beside the bed. She believed Tupper intended taking

her life to prevent her telling of what had happened. "I was too strong for him and he left," she said.

Special Indian Officer Warnke was called from the Agency to the Tupper home about 3:30 Tuesday evening. He found Claude Butler lying in the road near the Tupper home, badly beaten. Marshall Conner was in a similar condition nearby. Warnke declared the two Klamath Indians had been fighting with Tupper and Murdock. They were taken to the Agency hospital.

"When I left the Tupper home about 9 o'clock, everything seemed peaceful between Tupper and Murdock," Warnke said. "They told me they were going to bed."

Indian officers at the Agency phoned to Mr. George Adler, county coroner, Sheriff L. L. Low and state police officers who were investigating the case Wednesday morning.

**British Policy Told.**  
Neville Chamberlain, British Chancellor of the Exchequer, in an address to the morning plenary session clarified the war debts atmosphere somewhat with a declaration that the issue was "not within the scope of the conference." He supported Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald's attitude, by adding that "such a settlement is essential, however, if the other problems are to be solved."

Chamberlain told the conference that the British policy at the gathering was based, first, on the recovery of prices, second, on an effort to obtain greater stability of currencies, and third, abolition of exchange restrictions. He put forward several proposals to effectuate restoration of price levels, adding, "this cannot be accomplished by a monetary policy alone."

"There must be removal of trade barriers," he said. "There must not only be a cessation of tariff increases, but reduction of customs duties."

This was regarded as a gesture in support of the tariff truce and lower tariff program sponsored by the United States delegation.

**Britain Makes Part Payment**  
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States has indicated it will accept war debt payments in silver at 50 cents an ounce. The market value is about 36 cents, thus permitting the debtors a considerable saving under such an arrangement.

"It seemed impossible to contemplate another payment like that made last December," the chancellor said, "while other countries' obligations to us were suspended."

The thin lipped chancellor prefaced his long awaited debt statement by apologizing to commons for the frequent delays. He explained that the announcement had to be made simultaneously in London and Washington. The house members fidgeted during the apology, anxious for the news of the payment terms.

"The house will remember," Chamberlain said in his deliberate fashion, "that the last installment on the debt, due December 15 last, was subject to an exchange of notes between ourselves and the American government."

"In the note of December 11, we set forth at some length our conviction that a continuance of these obligations was a fatal barrier to the recovery of the world."

"Our standpoint on the matter was reinforced by the preparatory committee of the world economic conference, which at the outset in their report pointed out the problem of inter-governmental indebtedness had not been included because it lay outside the terms of the conference."

**Veteran Political Organization Meets**  
The Defenders of America political organization recently formed of all ex-service men met at the county court house Tuesday evening and nominated permanent officers to be elected at the next meeting, June 27.

The veterans went on record as firmly opposing the proposed transfer of county armory funds to other purposes. The veterans believed if proper facilities for the national guard unit here are not provided, Klamath will lose the organization.

senate returned to consideration of the veterans.

Senator Glass thrust his chin outward as he took the floor to criticize payments to veterans which he described as "treasury raids."

President Roosevelt said flatly today he would veto the independent offices bill which carries the veterans compensation provision. If the Stetler-Cutting amendment were included.

The chief executive campaigned personally during the day for his own proposal. He telephoned various senators and delivered minute by minute instructions to his leaders in the chamber.

During the day the administration had consented to a further compromise in an effort to force the early adjournment of

congress. Regulations affecting Spanish war, Boxer rebellion and Philippine insurrection veterans were relaxed in an effort to placate senatorial opposition.

Debate during the day was punctuated with bitter sarcasm and humor. Senator Huey Long, Democrat, Louisiana, arose just as a vote seemed in prospect to advise his colleagues that Louisiana was getting "a \$40,000 a year senator for \$10,000."
