ARENS TAKES OVER GOODRICH AGENCY

L. O. Arens, distributor of Plymouth and DeSoto automobiles in Klamath, announces taking over the agency for Goodrich tires. The tire shop is located in the Arens Service Garage at 724 Klamath avenue, next to the auto showrooms.

A new automobile tire, engineered to reduce to the minimum the possibility of blowouts, has been manufactured by The B. F. Goodrich company, according to Arens.

"This tire contains a ply processed by a special compound which resists internal heat, principal cause of blowouts," Arens said.

"The new series of Goodrich Silverstone tires, containing what tire engineers call the 'Life-Saver Golden Ply,' was tested for months in the 'torque chambers' of the Goodrich laboratories at Akron and then on the fastest track in the United States.

"Cars driven by impartial drivers were used for hours at high speeds equipped with the new tire running against tires of the old standard type.

"The speed trials proved without question that the latest Goodrich improvement gave three times the blowout protection to be had in tires without the special ply.

"Better automobiles and faster roads make possible increased driving speeds, and for these reasons tires must be designed to meet these new conditions which build up destructive internal friction and create high temperatures.

"Cross-sections of the new tires are now available for inspection and demonstration here, showing the new ply construction," Arens said.
