Not all babies have real lion cubs, cute little Shetland ponies and a score of varieties of dogs to pick from for playmates. But Mary Fisher, daughter of one of the officials with the Al. G. Barnes Circus has all these and in fact an endless array of the weird and bizarre that nature has bestowed, to entertain and amuse her. Mary is three years old and first saw the light of day in a New Hampshire city where the big show was playing. The boys and girls of the Al. G. Barnes Circus coming to Klamath Falls, Tuesday, June 20 for performances at 2 and 8 p. m., number nearly a score. Some of them represent the third and fourth generation of famous circus families. They comprise, in addition to Mary, two tiny dancers, a smart young bicycle rider, several acrobats and gymnasts, two Japanese boys and others who travel with their parents. The lungs are broadened and expanded by hearty exercise, and the muscles are hardened and developed by athletic work.

NATIONAL CHAMBER OFFICER TO VISIT

Ralph Bradford, manager of the commercial organization department of the United States chamber of commerce at Washington, D. C., will arrive in Klamath Falls and be the guest of the local chamber, July 31, it was announced at the regular board of directors luncheon Wednesday.

Bradford is coming west to lecture at the school for commercial organization secretaries at Stanford university and has agreed to stop in Klamath Falls on his return to Washington. A special army fund committee of the chamber recommended Wednesday that the county army fund be placed in a revolving fund for two years for use in the redemption of warrants. The recommendation was adopted and endorsed by the chamber.

A petition from the Fort Klamath district regarding the rebuilding of the Fort Klamath-Crater Lake road was turned over to the roads and highways committee for recommendation. Letters from several lumber companies were read in which they announced endorsement and cooperation of the plan of employing local labor.

Leslie Peyton was appointed in charge of the industrial movement for the co-operating of southern Oregon chambers of commerce. R. C. Groesbeck was appointed director in charge of the junior chamber of commerce organization.

LABOR ATTACKED BY LUMBER MEN

PORTLAND, Ore., June 15.—(UP)—Action of the American Federation of Labor in branding the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen as "company union" was attacked at a West Coast Lumber association meeting here today.

W. C. Ruegnitz, president of the 4L, denied the charge, saying the organization worked for the express interests of its 45,000 members in four northwest states.

The association was asked to add a clause in its code of fair competition, being drafted for President Roosevelt's industry recovery bill, recognizing the 4L. Roosevelt's measure specifies that labor shall have the right of collective bargaining with employers. A union controlled by the lumber companies, as the federation asserts the 4L is, could not bargain fairly, it was pointed out.

HOLLYWOOD, June 15.—(UP)—Dick Powell, picture actor is seriously ill of a combination of influenza and pneumonia, but his eventual recovery was assured, his physician, Dr. Stanley Immerman announced tonight.

Powell was stricken last Monday upon his return from a personal appearance tour of the east. He also received an insect bite which has resulted in an infection, his physician said.

The actor was placed in an oxygen tank at Cedars of Lebanon hospital yesterday when his breathing became troubled, but Dr. Immerman said the patient was better today.

He is allowed to receive no visitors.

GOVERNMENT MAPS NEW FARM PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, June 15, (AP)—The administration intends to raise \$250,000,000 by processing taxes on wheat and cotton, which it will levy at their maximum size in a bold program aimed to better long-range farm prices by cutting down production.

The government's plans provide that most of the sum will be used to reward farmers who agree to reduce their output in concert with the federal drive to halt the piling up of surpluses, long a price-depressing problem for growers of the two chief crops of the United States.

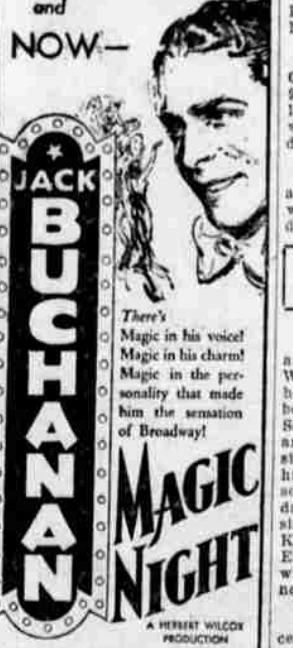
