The physical check of the company already has been completed, the commissioner said.

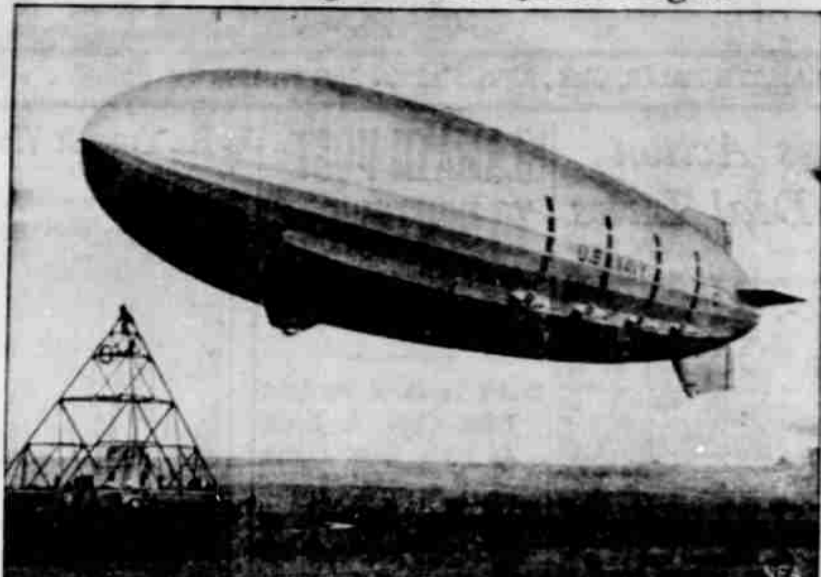
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BEAVER-DUCKS DROP ANOTHER

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F.R. at Helm Of America's Industry Bill

WASHINGTON, June 15, (AP) — President Roosevelt took command over the nation's industry today as he signed the powerful industrial supervision bill.

He also made law the Glass-Steagall bank reform-deposit insurance measure, devoting the main part of his time through the day to the formal approval of several vast measures enacted in the closing days of the extra session.

Cooperation Asked
As keystone of the Roosevelt recovery program, the industrial bill which also provides for a \$2,300,000,000 public works plan—was signed just before noon at a brief ceremony attended by the leaders of congress who guided the measure to enactment.

Soon afterward he signed the railroad reorganization measure designed to place the nation's rail lines in better order.

In signing the industrial bill the president described it as the "most important and far reaching legislation ever enacted by the American congress."

Determined to put the act into quick operation in order to put thousands to work and to reorganize working conditions in the interest of shorter hours and higher wages, the president summoned administrators to his side.

Hugh S. Johnson, who has taken care of the preliminary arrangements for the broad federal machinery to put it into effect, was on hand with the president.
