VACATION SCHOOL COMES TO CLOSE

The Presbyterian Vacation Church school has just concluded two weeks of successful work, under the direction of Miss Dorothy A. Smith, instructor of week-day Bible work in the public schools of the city. The enrollment reached 125 and the average attendance has been much better than anything previous. This has been accomplished without publicity or effort after numbers, but with emphasis on training.

The faculty consisted of 19 instructors and assistants with four departments in the school. Mrs. Myrtle Helm, principal of Pelican school, had charge of the eighth grade pupils. Mrs. Harry Hill directed the domestic science class. Mr. Alan Theodore Smith had charge of the manual training. Miss Nettie Tompkins had charge of the kindergarten and beginners' work. Mrs. Henry Perkins and Miss Eleanor Sherman of the primary and junior classes, and Miss Dorothy Smith of the intermediates. Others assisting in the instruction were Miss Paul Jean Wilson, Miss Jean Harvey, and Miss Marjorie Davis.

Forty received diplomas for perfect attendance and 10 awards were given for memorizing 50 or more verses of scripture. The school closed with a picnic at Moore park.

During the same period Miss Smith has been directing a similar school at Fairhaven, where the Presbyterian church has been officially assigned responsibility both locally and by the State Council of Home Missions and where the First Presbyterian church has been operating

on Sunday and holding vacation Bible work for the past five years. This school will probably continue for another week, as has been requested by the people of the neighborhood. The attendance and interest in this Fairhaven-Weyerhaeuser district has been fine throughout.

MILL OPERATORS FORM ASSOCIATION

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—A dozen sawmill operators in this community met here Wednesday night and decided to form the Lakeview Pine Lumber association.

The purpose of the association is to band together the manufacturers of pine lumber and pine lumber products in the Lakeview industrial district for the purpose of placing the facts which are peculiar to the lumber industry in this section before such trade association and governmental agencies as the facts may require in order to protect and promote the general welfare of its members in the application of the industrial control bill to them.

Most of the sawmills which

are members were constructed during the past two or three years, and run at full capacity during 1931-32. The members of the association are anxious to have their quotas computed upon a shipping basis for the reason that local mills can only operate between May 15 and October 1, because of the extremely high altitude.

A committee consisting of W. D. Starbird, Hugh De Armond, J. C. Clark, Harry Utley and Forrest E. Cooper was appointed to draft articles of association and by-laws which will be adopted at a meeting to be held here this coming Saturday evening.
