

Ex-Beaver Finds New Job

Iron Horse of Oregon State Football Team Goes to Philadelphia in National League. Wes Schumler, one of Coast's Outstanding Athletes, Russian Lion Acquires Modern Tactics.

Wes Schumler has a new job. This fellow who used to play football for the Oregon State college team under Paul J. Schuler has been traded to the Philadelphia team in the National League by the Boston Braves.

Schumler was one of the most powerful line plunkers on the Pacific coast and he undoubtedly was the best intercollegiate outfielder in either northern or southern divisions of the conference. He could hit, he could field and his baseball intelligence was highly developed.

When Schumler left Oregon State he was immediately given a trial with the Los Angeles team in the Pacific coast league. His success put him in the regular lineup and he was one of the leading hitters on the coast for two years.

He went up to the Braves several seasons ago at a high price and then Friday found a new job with the Phillies.

Schumler and Les Avrit, Klamath football coach, were leading contenders for the fullback position at Corvallis. Both were outstanding men but Schumler won the call thru his weight advantage. He developed the name of "Iron Horse" and Avrit, chief reserve, acquired the title of "Iron Pony."

Al Karasick, the veteran of the wrestling profession who meets Gus Sonnenberg Saturday night, turned almost overnight from a scientific athlete of the "old-school" into a rough and tumble proponent of the modern game.

Several months ago the Lion returned from one of his periodic barnstorming trips through the antipodes. He had been making these excursions along with Ted Thye for many seasons, and the profits of four were enormous.

The mat game in Australia had been excellent for a number of years and it was built up entirely through the attraction of pure wrestling skill. Karasick, originally a European star, was unacquainted with the wild sort of exhibition introduced into the game particularly by the tackling Sonnenberg. When the Lion left Australia and opened his American season at Portland, he found there was more demand for action and less for skill.

He immediately discarded his previous methods and became one of the most thunderous attackers in the profession. He can rival Sonnenberg with his wild offense.

The Lion has been more than a wrestler in his long career. He is particularly well known in Portland as a gymnast and tumbler and at one time was a nationally known ballet dancer. He has the grace and agility of a youngster and the power and experience of many years in the ring.

Until a few years ago he held one of the recognized lightweight championships of the world. This, however, was automatically abandoned when he built up his weight and entered the heavyweight class. At one time Karasick and Ted Thye, former athletic instructor at Multnomah club at Portland, were the leading American lightweights.

University of Oregon Puts Starr, Demaris in Big Meet

SOLDIER FIELD, Chicago, June 16 (UP)—Southern California opened its bid today for another national track and field championship by carrying the day in the preliminaries of the N. C. A. A. with 10 qualifiers in the 11 events which trials were held.

Oregon qualified Demaris in the javelin and Starr in the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

In the Bag? There were almost 500 collegiate athletes scattered over the big lake front stadium today, but no other college could muster the team strength of the Trojans and the finals tomorrow night under the arc lights promises to be another triumph for the sun tanned westerners.

Southern California's keenest competitor isn't likely to come from Stanford, as expected, but from Louisiana State, southeastern conference champions, and Indiana, second in the western conference meet.

Louisiana State placed seven qualifiers, the same number as Michigan, Big Ten champions, but the southerners qualified dangerous contenders, whereas the Wolverines placed mostly stragglers who are likely to be shut out in the finals. Indiana had six qualifiers, four of them potential first place winners.

Stanford was the day's biggest disappointment, getting only four qualifiers—Gus Moser in the low and high hurdles and Henri LaBorde in the discus and shot. Stanford has been expected to

The Boston Red Sox, cellar dwellers of the American league almost since time immemorial, have climbed out of their usual position to the dizzy heights of seventh place.

This is nothing new for the rejuvenated Red Sox of 1933—at one time during the second week of the campaign they were as high as seventh place—nor was their rise entirely unexpected. But the way in which they accomplished the feat of leaving the cellar made it appear that they have no intention of returning.
