

FRANK TROEH AGAIN WINNER

Portland Trapshooter Gets Second Title in Big State Meet

Portland's nationally known trapshooter, Frank Troeh, won his second title of the Oregon state trapshoot Saturday when he broke 47 targets out of 50 in the doubles. The veteran was followed by C. C. Follette of Forest Grove with 46.

Troeh entered the traps for the doubles after a perfect day in the singles. He had tied with S. G. Mendenhall of Grants Pass for the leadership in the first half of the Oregon singles championships. Both sportmen shattered 100 bluebirds straight.

Finals Sunday

The final of the event will be completed Sunday along with the handicaps and team competition.

George Young of Sumner, Wash., was the only other gunner to equal the mark set up by Troeh. Young's score, however, had no bearing on the Oregon title inasmuch as he was from out of the state.

The doubles title was the Portland man's second championship. Friday he won the class A honors in the Oregon class championships.

C. C. Follette of Forest Grove, runner up to Troeh in the doubles, led the preliminary handicap shoot with 95. The championship in this event will be determined Sunday.

The contest between Troeh and Mendenhall started in the class championships Friday. Troeh, capturing the class A title, clicked off 137 hits out of 200 and Mendenhall followed with 196.

150 Entered

Registration for the shoot neared the 150 mark Saturday afternoon to classify it as one of the largest ever held in the state. The high wind blowing in from Upper Klamath lake Friday was quieted as the gunners took their stands. Ideal weather conditions were contributing factors to the outstanding shoot.

G. Chiesman of Lewiston, Idaho, led the out of state division in the first half today with a score of 98. He was followed by O. M. Ford of Del Monte, Calif., and Art Berry, Yakima, Wash., with 97.

Earl Troeh, Portland, took the lead in the state professional championship with a score of 97. Visiting professionals, exhibiting in a special division, were led by Rush Haze of Denver with a perfect day at the traps. His score was 100.

Three women from Portland, Mrs. E. E. Young, Mrs. W. E. Savage and Mrs. N. W. Montgomery, competed with the men in the Oregon championships. Their scores will be completed Sunday and a championship determined.

The second halves of Saturday's uncompleted events will be finished on Sunday. The outstanding event for the final day will be the Oregonian shoot-off. Saturday's leaders:

Sacramento Maintains Lead; Portland Defeats Los Angeles

The Sacramento Senators turned in a masterful baseball game on their home lot today to defeat the Missions 4 to 3, and thus gain a notch in a torrid battle with Hollywood for leadership of the Pacific Coast league.

Hollywood, meanwhile, was on the losing end of a 5 to 2 contest with Oakland on the latter's field.

As the two leading clubs prepared for week-end games, Sacramento had a total of 44 wins and 30 defeats against 40 wins and 32 defeats for Hollywood.

Seattle, holding down last place in the league, lost a 9 to 6 decision to San Francisco, a game in which just a scant few games ahead of them in the percentage column.

Portland, standing in third place, won from Los Angeles by a 4 to 2 score.

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AL KARASICK LOSES ON FOUL

Russian Lion Nearly Upsets ex-Champion Sonnenberg

Al Karasick, the black-haired Russian Lion from Portland, upset completely the most imaginative prediction for the outcome to his bout with Gus Sonnenberg, ex-heavyweight champion of the world, at the Legion hall Saturday night. The Lion, fighting aggressively all the way, smothered Sonnenberg into submission and then lost the match on a foul.

This veteran wrestler from Portland—a former world champion himself—saw and claimed an opportunity to upset one of the most outstanding athletes in America's professional mat game. He attacked Sonnenberg for the third fall, headlocked him into near unconsciousness and then slipped on a powerful Boston crab hold.

Sonnenberg Nearly Out

The famous ex-all-American from Dartmouth college immediately made fast action toward the ropes and freedom beyond the ring. But Karasick, determined on victory, strengthened his hold and refused to give it up when Sonnenberg was half-hanging from the ring.

Ray Frisbie, referee from Medford, quickly called a foul and awarded the match to Sonnenberg. Karasick, protesting the decision, called upon the 900 spectators at the Legion hall to join him in violent objection.

He attacked Frisbie and had the excited audience in turmoil. Klamath police officers rushed to the ring, ordered the athletes to the dressing rooms and began clearing the Legion hall.

Frisbie Issues Challenge

The match was turned into a moral victory for the Portlander but officially for the western campaign of the ex-champion from the east continues unbroken in its victories.

Sonnenberg, as powerful as the day he made the all-American fight for Dr. C. W. Spears, former Oregon coach, won the first fall in 17 minutes with a series of flying shoulder butts. The men had wrestled evenly until Sonnenberg tore from the ropes in one of his famous and effective rushes.

The Lion captured the second fall in 16 minutes with a Boston crab hold, the same hold later giving the match to Sonnenberg on a foul.

Referee Frisbie was in difficulty with Karasick all through the rough bout. He continually warned the Portlander for his use of the strangle hold and more than once a real battle brewed between official and participant.

Frisbie, resenting Karasick's actions, put in a challenge to meet him here in the next Legion main event.

Harry Demetral of Seattle won a well-wrestled preliminary against Joe Reynolds of Salt Lake. Reynolds took the first fall in 26 minutes with an inverted one hold. Demetral took the second in three minutes with a body slam. The Salt Lake man injured his shoulder in the tumble and was unable to appear for the third fall.

HEACOX AIDS PELICANS

The Klamath Pelicans, captained by Jack Heacox, owner of the Vox Theatre, as their godfather, will be known in the future as the Klamath Vox Pelicans. Heacox came to the aid of the team this week and assisted it in purchasing bats and baseballs. He also arranged transportation to games in the valley.

Also the time limit has been extended from four to six days, every member being expected to play at least one match in that period. Any player failing to accept a match within six days forfeits his place to the challenger.

The above rules go into effect Sunday, June 18. The doubles ladder, also a challenge affair, is already in progress. In a match played in a hard north wind Friday evening Hugh and Robertson, formidable doubles team, defeated Huls and Dent by the scores of 6-2 and 6-4.
