Library Club Sponsors First Annual Display of Iris at Garden Show Tea

OUTSTANDING in the social calendar of the week past was the first annual iris show, presented under the auspices of the Library club of Klamath Falls at the beautiful home of Mrs. R. R. Macartney on Thursday afternoon.

The beautifully landscaped grounds of the Macartney estate at the crest of Washington street hill provided a fitting background for the display of beautiful iris blooms of Klamath gardens. The climatic conditions of this city are perfect for the cultivation of iris, and a growing interest in rare and named varieties of this orchid-like flower is manifest among iris fanciers of the city.

More than 200 guests called during Thursday afternoon to view the iris display, and to partake of tea. Proceeds of the afternoon were donated by the Library club to the civic recreation program for children of the city.

Club meetings in Klamath Falls are in a state of suspended animation until activities resume in the fall, and summer interest is centered about summer weddings, informal bridge and out-of-door sports.

From Hollywood to the Golden Gate the state has gone bicycle-balmy, and there's no use trying to soft-pedal the fact.

Most every town has rubbed its eyes to behold a brand-new bicycle-mental "garage" with shiny new wheels parked in front waiting for someone to try them out at so much an hour.

But in Hollywood, in Los Angeles, and in this city, there is one on practically every corner where one of the late lamented miniature golf courses lay down a couple of years ago and died.

On several of the Golden Gate parkways, bicycle traffic got so tangled up with auto traffic recently that police had to paint an outside strip on the roadway and mark it "Reserved for Cycling."

On some park boulevards both car and cat-burners have been barred, turning the boulevards into cycle-paths.

Yes, We Are Collegiate!

The campuses of every college are cluttered with shiny new nickel-plated wheels and dusty bikes dragged from barn lofts. Students and teachers roll merrily to and from class, carefully ringing their bells to avoid running down the roller-skaters.

School children, stenographers and clerks pedal their way to work or take a Saturday half-holiday on two wheels instead of four.

In the swanky San Mateo district the younger social set has by some miracle produced a lot of tandems. Morning and evening find groups of young couples swinging along on the tandems, usually in revealing, appealing costumes.

At a recent charity circus of the San Mateo Gymkhana Club, cycling was featured. Herbie Fleischacker, Jr., famous Stanford football star, and Miss Patricia Tobin won honors in tandem races. The bicycle party is now The Thing, and society is turning from cocktail-shakers to coaster brakes.
