GRAINS SOARING ON CHICAGO MART

CHICAGO, June 19, (AP)—Wheat, corn and rye went soaring today about 3c a bushel, with most of the grain list overtopping the season's high price records.

As a result of prolonged extreme high temperatures and lack of moisture, crop authorities said hopes for a 1933 big yield of spring wheat had been abandoned. Renewal of inflation talk also was a source of skyrocketing prices.

Wheat closed strong, 2 1/2c above Saturday's finish, corn 1 1/2c up, oats 2 1/2c advanced and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2c.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 19, (AP)—Financial markets were borne upward today on a new wave of inflationary psychology. As the dollar declined sharply in foreign exchange markets, following reports the Washington administration disapproved of currency stabilization at present rates, stocks soared 2 to 3 or more points. The close was strong. Approximately 6,000,000 shares changed hands.

A rush of buyers at the opening sent prices surging to levels where they remained substantial portions of their last week's losses. All groups participated in the recovery. While there were intermittent pauses to absorb profit-taking, the movement was forward throughout. Grains were up from 2 to 3 cents a bushel, around New Year's highs, bar rails and bonds were strong.

Case led the fast moving stocks with a gain of around 9 points, reflecting the upward movement of farm products. Advances of 6 or more were recorded by DuPont, U. S. Smelting, Union Pacific, Western Union, Allied Chemical, Johns-Manville and National Distillers. Shares with gains of 1 to around 5 included American Telephone, New York Central, United Aircraft, Chesapeake & Ohio, Santa Fe, General Electric, U. S. Steel, General Motors, Consolidated Gas, Columbia Gas, Anaconda, North American, Delaware & Hudson, Chrysler, Liggett & Myers, Kennecott, and American Can.
