PORTLAND GETS BIG GRID GAME

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PORTLAND, Ore., June 19 (AP)—After an absence of 18 years, the annual big game—the gridiron meeting of Oregon and Oregon State, will come to Portland this year. The game will be played in Multnomah stadium on Armistice day. It has been decided after weeks of dickering and several changes in the stadium schedule.

The 1934 Oregon-OSC game will be played in Eugene, and Corvallis will get the match in 1935.

The Oregon-Utah game, billed for the stadium Nov. 15, will be played either at Eugene or Salt Lake City, and the Washington State-Oregon State game, scheduled for Portland, will be taken to Corvallis.

Oregon State and Gonzaga will play in the stadium here Oct. 7. The first game in Portland this season will see Oregon Normal and Pacific college at Stockton in a tangle. It will be Alonzo Stagg's first introduction to Pacific coast football.

Going into Sunday's double-header, Washington had won six successive victories, mostly on terrific clutching, and was in position to take the lead by winning two games from the St. Louis Browns if the New York Yankees' losing streak lasted long enough for them to drop a twin bill to the Chicago White Sox.

The Senators negotiated the first set easily enough, slaming George Blaeholder's offerings for 15 hits and a 14-1 triumph but they flazied out in the second game when honors by Sam West and Bruce Campbell netted the Browns a 3-2 triumph.

The Yankees, meanwhile, protected their lead by taking the opener from Chicago 6-4 but the pale hose salvaged something for the largest crowd that ever saw a ball game in Chicago, 53,395, by winning the second clash 5-4 in ten innings with the aid of a wild throw by Wilcy Moore.

PORTLAND WINS OREGON SHOOT

Frank Troeh Grabs Four State Crowns In Meet Here

The Portland trapshooters, headed by Frank M. Troeh, nationally known sportsman, were in full possession of the major title at the Oregon state shoot when it came to a close at the Klamath Gun club Sunday.

Frank Troeh, Portland Gun Club ace, was over-burdened with trophies at the end of the final day. Troeh captured the Oregon Class A championship on Friday, the doubles title on Saturday and the handicap on Sunday. Beyond this he was named all-around champion of the tournament, led the Portland club to the Oregonian team championship and was high in average on all targets in every event he entered.

Son Wins Prohonors

Earl Troeh, Frank Troeh's son, won the Oregon professional championship. The younger Troeh, an officer of the Portland Gun Club, enthusiastically acclaimed the tournament as the largest state shoot in the United States this year. He declared there was little possibility it would be surpassed.

Nearly 150 gunners were at the targets through the three days and more than 67,000 blue rocks released from the traps.

The Oregonian team shoot-off, culminating a season of telegraphic competition, attracted several thousand spectators. Portland and Medford were tied at 6:00 P. M. Second place honors in the singles were taken by Ernest Nitschelm of the Klamath Gun club who added a clean record Sunday to his 98 of Saturday to set up 198 hits.

Frank Troeh had taken the doubles title Saturday and added his fourth title Sunday in the handicap. He shattered 97 clay targets at 24 yards and was followed by V. C. Plath of Bend with 96 at 21 yards.

Idaho Man High

G. Chiesman of Lewiston, Idaho, however, scored highest in the handicap with a 98. His outstanding status elevated him from the Oregon championship.

Mrs. E. E. Young of Portland won the women's singles honors for Oregon with 148. She had no trouble with her nearest competitor, Mrs. W. E. Savage of Portland who scored 132.
