

CRATER LAKE EVENTS SET FOR JULY 1

The recently organized Klamath County Junior Chamber of Commerce will embark upon its most expansive undertaking July 1 as the host to all Oregon and Northern California for the official opening of Crater Lake park. Although entrances into the nationally known wonderland have been open since the first weeks in April, the annual ceremonies have been reserved for July 1, the anniversary of the lake's discovery.

A huge caravan starting at Redding, the headquarters of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association, will arrive in Klamath Falls, June 30, over the Weed highway. The caravan, picking up additional visitors on route, will be met by a delegation from Klamath Falls and escorted to the city.

Banquet Planned
A banquet will be held here the night of the caravan's arrival. Invitations will be extended to chambers of commerce in Oregon and northern California and several thousand visitors will be accommodated. The junior chamber will take over concessions at the park for the day.

The caravan from the south will stop in Klamath Falls June 30, before continuing to the park on Saturday. It will return to California through the Medford entrance and probably visit Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland on Sunday.

RAINS ELIMINATE HAZARD OF FIRES

SALEM—(UP) — Most favorable fire season in many years is forecast by the Oregon forestry department.

Reports from all sections of the state indicate that due to heavy rains early in June, there is as yet no serious fire hazards in the forests, Lynn Cronmiller, head of the department, said. While late rains are not unusual in the northern portion of the state, they are not so frequent in southern Oregon.

Assistant Forester S. P. King, who recently returned from the John Day country, reported that many side roads are so muddy it is still impossible to drive a car over them. So far, only a few of the regular employees are in the woods.

An unusual amount of snow in both the Cascades and the Coast range has tended to delay the fire season, Cronmiller said. District Warden Walker of Polk county reports there are still several feet of snow on Laurel mountain in the western part of his district.

In Coos county, there are two feet of snow on Eden ridge. Throughout the Cascades there is considerable snow on the higher hills, and it will be some time before it is necessary to put many rangers in the field.

Telephone lines and trails in the forests are in poor shape. The heavy snowfall has broken lines and torn them from insulators. Trails have been blocked by branches, brush and small trees broken down by the snow.

Because of reduction in forest department funds this year, a fewer number of fire inspectors will be employed this season.
