CIVIL SERVICE POSITIONS LAG

SALEM, Ore., (UP)—Oregon citizens have received but 48 per cent of the number of civil service posts to which they are entitled.

The state should receive 259 civil service jobs on the basis of population, a federal report showed. There are 125 Oregonians working for the government. At Washington, where the greatest portion of the government employes work, the nearest states are given the greatest advantage. District of Columbia, entitled to 132 employes, has 10; Virginia, entitled to 599, has 2,373. Maryland has 2,112 against a quota of 444 on population basis. Appointments from Iowa and Vermont are also slightly in excess of population quotas.

California's quota is 22 per cent filled. Washington is 54 per cent. Idaho's 78 per cent, and Nevada's 60 per cent.

One of the heavy bars hit the machine, damaging it considerably. The chauffeur was able to move the car from the tracks only a few seconds before a train hurtled past. The former Kaiser, unhurt, continued the drive.

WHEAT DROPS IN PROFIT TAKINGS

CHICAGO, June 20, (AP)—Aggressive profit taking sales turned all grains downward late today, with traders influenced by indications the heat wave north-west had been broken.

More than 1 1/2 per bushel was clipped from the day's top figures for wheat. Numerous crop damage reports from American and Canadian spring wheat territory were ignored late.

Wheat closed unsettled. It to 1 1/2 under yesterday's finish; corn, 8c to 1 1/2c down; oats unchanged to 1/4c lower, and provisions varying from 20c decline to a rise of 30c.

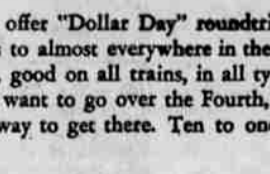
