

Portland Gets Grid Feature

Oregon and Oregon State Contest Likely to Remain A Way From Campus Permanently. Bernie Hughes at Crater Lake. Shift Considered in Southern Oregon League.

The Oregon-Oregon State football game, the annual climax to athletic excitement in Oregon, has been removed from the campus and sent to Portland for this fall. The contest, ranking high in the northwest as the most outstanding gridiron dispute of any season, will be played on Multnomah field, November 11.

There are any number of alumni prepared to forecast this game's permanent schedule for the biggest city in Oregon. It was in 1917 when the last Beaver-Webfoot fight was taken to Portland, and since then there has been yearly agitation to try the stunt again.

Oregon has been particularly favorable toward the change and has encouraged it for several years. Last year it was thought certain to be shifted to Portland, and even press passes were issued to newspapermen. At the last minute, however, officials at the Corvallis school refused and the game was played on Bell field.

This year jurisdiction for promoting the game reverted to Eugene and the Oregon officials immediately completed details for sending it to Portland.

It is more than possible the game will not come back to Eugene and Corvallis for the financial success guaranteed at Portland will not be discarded. The Multnomah stadium won't be sufficient to hold the multitude of spectators at Portland who will want to see the brilliant struggle between Prink Callison's Webfoots and Lon Stiner's mysterious Beavers.

Bernie Hughes, husky center and co-captain of the Oregon football team, has become a ringer at Crater Lake park for the summer. Hughes, well-known here as a member of Prink Callison's intercollegiate champions at Medford, looks bigger and tougher than he ever did—and he always was big and tough.

This athlete, selected an almost every all-coast team last year, will work with Mark Temple, halfback from Pendleton, in captaining the Webfoots in their football campaign next season. These youths were the stars of Oregon's victory over the Beavers last season, and were two of the leading performers all through the season.

Edwards' Outfit Meets Coquille on Fairgrounds Field.

The Klamath Pelicans, once set back in their drive for a Southern Oregon championship, have an opportunity to take command of the league leadership here Sunday against the undefeated outfit from Coquille.

Francis Edwards, playing manager, has switched the game to the fair grounds from Modoc field. This move was taken to provide covering for the spectators. A hot sun on the open stands at Modoc field, Edwards said, was keeping fans away. Accommodations will be made for several hundred spectators Sunday.

Coquille maintained its lead Sunday by defeating the heretofore unbeaten Medford outfit, 6 to 1. At the same time Edwards' men were keeping pace with a victory over the three-times-defeated Eagle Point squad. Roseburg trimmed Ashland Sunday to stay in the tie for second place, 6 to 4.

The Pelicans, one of the strongest of the six teams, have been given an even chance to bring Coquille into its first defeat. Klamath, losing to Roseburg two weeks ago, has recovered its stride.

Molatore, Edwards' star southpaw, probably will start against Gilbert for Coquille. Edwards will be behind the bat for Klamath and Houser for Coquille.
