## When Cupid Whipped the Kaiser



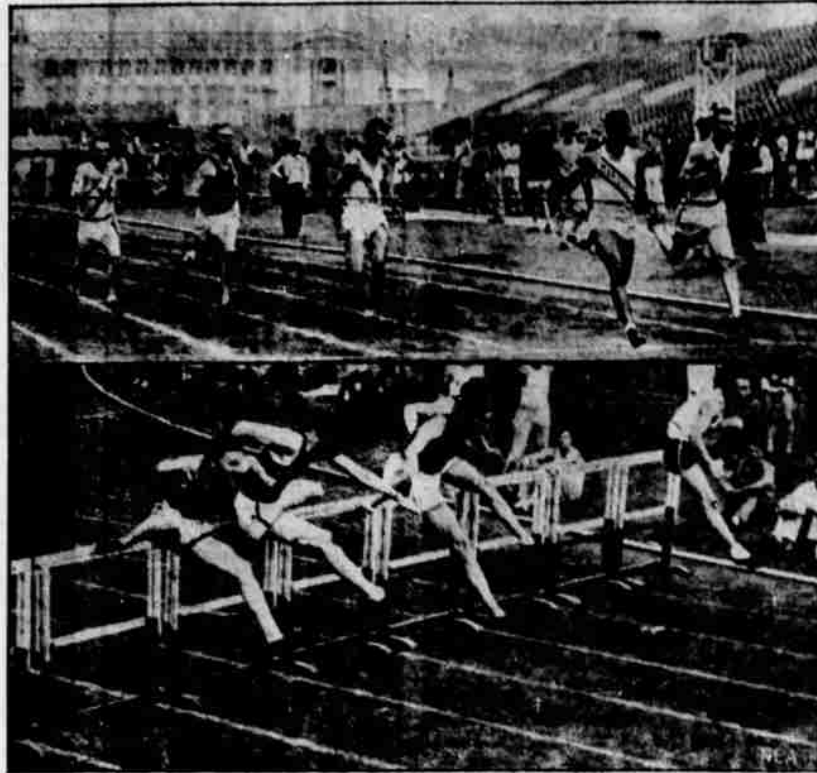

## ACTION AT N. C. A. A. TRACK MEET



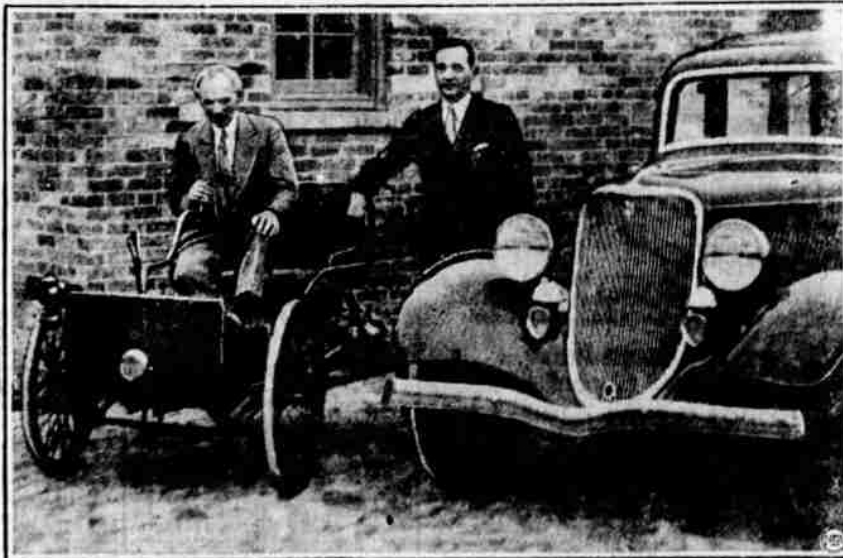
