21 HERDS TESTED IN MONTH OF MAY

Twenty-one herds were on test in the Klamath Cow Testing association during May, with 488 cows enrolled, of which 73 were dry. Total production was 317,617 pounds of milk and 11,986.9 pounds fat. Seventy-three cows made 40 pounds of butterfat or over. Average production was 651 pounds milk and 24.56 pounds fat. High herd of over 20 cows belonged to Earl Mack of Spring Lake, 23 cows averaging 715 pounds milk and 35.7 pounds fat. High herd of 12 to 20 cows belonged to E. T. McLaughlin, Merrill, 15 cows averaging 1225 pounds milk and 39.9 pounds fat. High herd under 12 cows belonged to C. B. Bord, Merrill, 11 cows averaging 1124 pounds milk and 41.3 pounds fat.

Shap, a 6-year-old Guernsey, was high cow for the month, making 1749 pounds milk and 92.3 pounds butterfat. She belongs to Earl Mack. Second high cow belonged to Leonard Lewis, Olney, Lizz, a 7-year-old Holstein, making 1081 lbs. milk and 79.2 pounds fat. STANDARD OIL GETS NAVY JOB

The largest lubricating oil contract ever placed on the Pacific coast has been awarded by the United States navy to Standard Oil company of California, officials of that company announced here today.

The award includes the entire requirements of the United States navy at Pacific coast ports, including Alaska and Hawaii, this being the first time that any company has won all of the navy's lubricating business for the coast. It also includes the requirements of those federal departments that purchase under navy contract and that operate in the Pacific coast states.

The contract calls for 1,300,000 gallons of lubricating oils, including all of the navy's Pacific coast requirements of aviation engine oils, and turbine, motor steam cylinder, marine engine and compressor oils, motor boat and automobile oils.

WARMER WEATHER BOOSTS GRAINS

CHICAGO, June 21, (AP)—Indications of a return of hot weather in the Northwest did much to give a strong upward slant to wheat and other cereals today. Unfavorable crop reports were a dominating factor, with spring wheat advice bulging both as to American and Canadian prospects. There was also an increased disposition to consider winter wheat damage, especially adverse reports from Illinois and Indiana. At the last September and December wheat and distant deliveries of corn reached new high price records for the season. Wheat closed buoyant, 2c to 3c above yesterday's finish; corn, 1 1/2c to 3c up; oats, 1 1/2c to 1 1/2c advanced, and provisions varying from 12c decline to a rise of 2c.
