

WONDERLAND JOINS CRATER LAKE EVENT

Two important events will be recorded through the activities of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland Association within the coming few weeks.

One will be the opening of the loop road in Lassen Park, the date of which is yet to be determined, but it will be very early in July.

The second will be the official opening of Crater Lake on July 1, when the annual Shasta-Cascade good will tour will reach the lake on that date for the purpose of conducting the official ceremonies. This annual tour of Shasta-Cascadians will visit some of the outstanding scenic attractions where it will be entertained by organizations en route, and this should be a good opportunity for those who have not visited these places to do so under conditions favorable to enjoying the occasion. Entertainment, hospitality, and good fellowship on the entire trip will be the outstanding features.

The tour will start from Redding at noon, June 30, and will visit Dunsmuir, Mt. Shasta City, Weed, Dorris, Klamath Falls, Fort Klamath, Crater Lake, Prospect, Trail, Medford, Ashland and Yreka. Prominent guests of the association, newspaper writers and civic and official representatives will be on the tour and participate in the exercises.

Guests of the tour will include prominent state and county officials, representatives of civic and tourist organizations covering all of the coast.

JACKSON RELEASES FISHING REPORTS

The first weekly report of Elton V. Jackson, new game warden for the county with the state police department, concerning fishing conditions in the county was given Wednesday morning.

Jackson reported a number of limit catches have been made at Seven Mile creek since the opening June 15. Eastern brook trout in the creek are biting, angle worms, salmon eggs and some good catches are made on blue uplight and grey buckie hooks.

Only a few fish are being caught in Wood river due to the muddy condition of the water. Fishing conditions are expected to be better by Sunday.

Roads to Lake o' the Woods and Fish lake are passable but not good, Jackson reported. Few bass are being caught on bass-o-Reno hooks at Lake o' the Woods.

At Fish lake, seven miles past Lake o' the Woods, fishing conditions are reported to be excellent with practically all anglers making limit catches on baste lure. Baste being used are salmon eggs, angle worms and liver.

The forest conservation camp crews are working on roads to both the lakes and expect to have them in much better condition by Sunday, Jackson declared.

General fishing conditions in all accessible streams and waters within the county are fair.

Lake Resort Will Open On Friday

The Diamond lake summer resort will be opened Friday, according to an announcement received by the chamber of commerce Wednesday morning from George L. Howard, manager of the Diamond Lake Improvement company.

At present only a few miles of the Diamond lake road is blocked with snow drifts. They will be cleared by Friday when the stores, boat houses and lodge at the lake will open for summer business.

The Diamond lake resort is opening several weeks later than usual this year due to the heavy snow fall of the past winter. Many Klamath Falls residents as well as summer home owners of the Pacific coast who enjoy summer fishing at the lake will welcome the opening.
