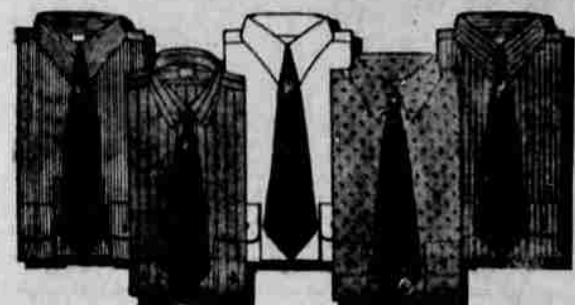

ARRESTS MADE BY KLAMATH POLICE
