

Coast Race Lively

Three Different Teams Hold First Place in Three Weeks. Oregon, Oregon State Schedules Released.

If it was a race the Pacific Coast league needed to revive baseball interest, then interest should be booming as it hasn't boomed in several years. The shift in 1932 removing the championship from the California teams and transferring the title to the Vaughn street park in Portland was sufficient to encourage all eight owners, but none considered the possibility of such excitement as this season has developed.

Change. That is exactly the thing bringing about a new character to the coast league, a league nearly smothered with depression at the start of the season.

The four first division clubs, Sacramento, Hollywood, Portland and Los Angeles, have been so closely upon each other's heels, there has been a continual upsetting of positions for the last three weeks.

Just three weeks ago the Portland Beavers-Ducks, defending champions for the first time in 18 years, found themselves reasonably secure in their leadership. The next week the Hollywood Stars gathered themselves for a dramatic rush forward, ousted Portland and assumed command.

This week it is Sacramento, and the Solons have gone into a five-game lead.

One of the most stimulating incidents in the league has been the awakening of the San Francisco Missions. These Missions—all youngsters in the baseball world—were hopelessly outclassed at the start of the schedule. Now they have advanced to the top position in the second division. Oakland, early season leader, has slumped to seventh place, but Seattle, still in the eighth position, has strengthened sufficiently to find itself within striking distance for a better hold.

All in all, the Pacific Coast league has turned out much better than expected two months ago.

Coaches can no longer uphold difficult schedules as a reason for losing football games. A glance at the completed roster for games for Pacific Coast conference football teams next year describes equally trying schedules for each school.

Both Oregon and Oregon State, called to prominence this week through the arrangement for playing their traditional contests at Portland, have a list of games dismaying enough to make the coach of a few years ago give up in despair.

Paul T. The threat was sufficient to arouse Salem to protect its one big athletic event, and undoubtedly it will act with greater efficiency and interest next season just to prove it is best equipped and better prepared to foster basketball.

Trailing by three runs and with two men out in the fifth, the cellar Seals went wild Wednesday and subdued the Mission, 6-5. A walk, Jimmy Zina's triple, Jerry Donovan's circuit wallop, Elias Funk's double and Joe De Maggio's single gave San Francisco four runs in the final inning and the game.
