Sullivan, Peter Maher, Jim Corbett, Bob Fitzsimmons, Tommy Ryan, Johnny Kilbane, Young Corbett, Dempsey, Tunney, Sharkey—from the first to the last. . . and naming Tunney as the most devastating fighter ever to step into a ring. . . and opining that Bat Nelson would not amount to a row of pins in our present day 15-rounders, because it took the old batter 25 rounds to get started!

Joe is an "eater" of the weed, consuming some 60 cigarettes a day. . . and he chews gum incessantly when he's working, but not at home. . . and the home is a nice one bought by Joe out of his rather generous ring earnings.

Last American Eliminated In British Tourney

HOYLAK, England, June 23. (AP)—George T. Dunlap Jr., sole American survivor in the British amateur golf championship, was eliminated in the semi-final round today 4 and 3, by the veteran British Internationalist, Hon. Michael Scott.

The slim young American, title holder of the United States intercollegiate title, held his own with Scott through the first nine holes of the match, which they finished all square, but failed to win a hole on the incoming route, Scott taking the lead at the 11th to end the match four holes later. On his way to the semi-final Dunlap defeated several leading golfers of the British empire, including C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville, Canadian holder of the United States Amateur title, and Lister Hartley, British Walker Cup star.

RUSSIAN LION TRIMS FRISBIE

Medford Athlete Unable To Return for Final Period

The strangest lion in the jungle, the veteran Al Karasick of Portland, upset rugged young Frisbie in the wild west match of the Legion hall season. The Russian Lion, unrelenting in his attack, crushed Frisbie so completely for the second fall the match was brought to an end before a deciding round could be wrestled.

Frisbie, outweighing the shaggy man from Portland, hurried through the first fall and took the advance when he pinned Karasick in 17 minutes. The fall was won on a series of flying butts, shaking the arena and almost knocking the Russian unconscious.

Frisbie Counted Out. Karasick came back to the ring fresh and strong, trapped Frisbie in a powerful Boston crab hold and forced him to crawl out of the ring. The Medford man was so thoroughly punished he was counted out before he could rise. The second fall came in nine minutes.

Frisbie was too badly injured to return to the ring at the end of the five-minute rest period. Karasick, sensing his first victory here after losing to Gus Sonnenberg on a foul last week, refused to extend the period and was awarded the match.

The lion took the aggressive in roughness at the start and attacked Frisbie with his fists.

Washington Senators Enter Tie With Yankees For Leadership

(By HUGH S. FULLENTON, Jr. Associated Press Sports Writer) The night behind their own bats plus the difficulties the New York Yankees have encountered on the road finally have pulled the Washington Senators into a tie with the world champions for the American league lead.

Continuing their terrific clouting the Senators defeated the Chicago White Sox Thursday, 11-4, while the Yankees were dropping a 6-4 decision to the St. Louis Browns, and moved into a first place deadlock at 27 victories and 23 defeats. It marked only the third time this season the Yankees had been deprived of solid possession of the lead.

The Senators' victory was their tenth in 11 games in a winning spree that has coincided with Manager Joe Cronin's batting rampage and with the Yankees' troublesome tour. On June 8 when the Yanks began the trip which has resulted in 10 defeats in 16 games, Cronin was batting only .303. Thursday he again set the pace for his team with four singles and lifted his average to .352. Heinie Manush, another big gun in Washington's rush, carried his streak of consecutive hitting through 25 games.

National League Stars Named For Contest At World's Fair

CHICAGO, June 23. (AP)—President John Heydler and his All-Star manager, John McGraw, have picked their National league players for that big one-game argument with the best in the American league, July 6.

Behind Curt Davis' steady tossing, the Seals took their third straight game from the Reds, 4-3. Johnny Bottarini's circuit blow in the fourth gave the Seals their fourth and winning run.

The Yankees, meanwhile, encountered pitching trouble again as the last place Browns hammered Walter Brown and then bunched a pair of hits off Danny MacFayden with a costly error to score the winning run in the ninth.

Chicago's defeat dropped the Pale Hose into fifth place, a point behind the Athletics, who hammered out eight runs in the fifth inning and defeated the third-place Cleveland Indians 11-6. The Boston Red Sox scored 9-3 to leave the Cards a game and a half behind.

Ray Benge pitched the Brooklyn Dodgers into fifth place in the elder circuit, holding the Pittsburgh Pirates to four hits to win his fifth straight victory, 9-0. Ed Brandt sent the Boston Braves into a sixth-place tie with Cincinnati with a 3-1 triumph over the Chicago Cubs, giving only seven safeties.
