

THREE MEN KILLED IN AIR DISASTER

FRANKFORT, Mich., June 24 (AP)—Mrs. Charles Rennie, Jr., 27, who clung for 24 hours to the wreckage of an airplane that crashed into Lake Michigan Thursday and watched her husband and two other men slip to their deaths, was brought to Frankfort today, weak from exposure and on the verge of hysteria.

She had been picked up at 8 p. m. Friday by the Ann Arbor car ferry No. 7, which sighted her clinging to a raft fashioned from a cushion of the plane and a one gallon gasoline can.

Hunt For Bodies Starts
Mrs. Rennie told how first the mechanic of the plane, Peter Keller, 24, loosed his hold on the raft, then its pilot, James Gillette, 23, and finally her husband, Charles Rennie, Jr., 23, vice president of the Rennie Oil company of Traverse City, alighted to their deaths. The light raft was too fragile to hold all four, and the men clung to its sides after lifting Mrs. Rennie to a perch on the cushion.

Mrs. Rennie said she could not have held her place on the raft much longer when the car ferry bore in sight. "I was losing consciousness," she said. "Then I saw the bodies. I was screaming as loudly as I could when they sent a small boat to me and took me aboard."

Mrs. Rennie was met here by relatives and friends who took her immediately to Traverse City, her home.

Off the port of Frankfort, coast guards from the Frankfort and Manistee stations were cruising in search of the bodies of the three victims. The raft on which Mrs. Rennie was found was brought here by the car ferry. The cushion which had saved her life was 33 by 41 inches and four and one-half inches thick.

"As the air police do not possess aircraft or sporting planes, they were unable to reach the fast flying foreign planes, which escaped unidentified."

Chancellor Hitler's "Voelkischer Beobachter" sounded the keynote for newspapers' denunciation of the Versailles post-war treaty with the black headline: "Down with the unbearable chains of the Versailles treaty."

PARIS, June 24. (UP)—Aimee Semple McPherson was reported seriously ill tonight and probably will not be able to leave the American hospital for five or six weeks.

Dr. Charles S. Rowe, the hospital gynecologist, said:

"Mrs. McPherson came to me 10 days ago. It was the first time I had seen her. She was then a very sick woman. I found it necessary to act immediately, performing a major abdominal operation."

"She is still extremely ill and is not likely to be in condition to leave the hospital for five or six weeks."

REVIVAL FORECAST FOR LUMBER TRADE

SEATTLE, June 24 (AP)—Hope for revival of at least a billion dollar national market—home modernization—was seen today by the West Coast Lumbermen's association in section 202 of the public works portion of the federal industry recovery act.

The section calls for "construction, reconstruction, alteration or repair under public regulation or control of the low-cost housing and slum-clearance projects."

The association interpreted the section as "offering an opportunity in every city and county throughout the United States for local control laws to be set up under which low cost homes would be built, rebuilt, altered or repaired."

Japan Trying to Buy Chinese Road

TOKIO, June 25. (Sunday)—(UP)—Manchoukuo and Soviet Russia delegates here for a conference regarding possible sale of the Chinese Eastern railway were hopeful today that negotiations might end in a friendly deal that will eliminate strained relations between the two governments.

The road is owned jointly by China and Russia, and its operation had been the subject of dispute for several months. Trouble reached a peak when the Manchoukuo government refused to let traffic move over the western border of Manchuria, claiming the Soviet officials of the line had confiscated considerable rolling stock and refused to return it to Manchuria.

Japan has made tentative offers to purchase the line, but none has been acceptable to Russia.

Amberjack Stops At Island Harbor

NORTHEAST HARBOR, Me., June 24. (UP)—The Amberjack II carrying President Roosevelt rolled into this little port of Mt. Desert Island tonight, the guiding channel marks picked out for her by the searchlight of the navy patrol boat Cuyahoga. Mr. Roosevelt set sail late in the day having been delayed

while the auxiliary engine of his little schooner was repaired in the sheltered waters of Pulpit Harbor. It marked the second time on the vacation cruise that night running was resorted to in order that the objective could be reached on schedule. The sky was overcast accentuating the blackness as the Amberjack with a favorable following breeze smashed through the choppy rollers with Skipper Roosevelt at the tiller.

CHURCHES ATTACK REPEAL MOVEMENT

PORTLAND, June 24 (AP)—Methodist laymen of Oregon will campaign vigorously for retention of the 15th amendment and have affirmed their intention of voting "for anything that looks dry."

Hundreds of them applauded enthusiastically as leaders of their church flayed the liquor traffic in Friday's session of the 31st annual Oregon conference.

Dr. E. Stanley Jones, world famous Methodist missionary, flayed the liquor traffic during the day. He remarked that in some Chinese provinces the only means of raising taxes is through production of opium which, in turn, is the ruin of the people.

"And I want to say," he declared, "that I can see no difference between paying taxes with opium and paying them with beer."

Italian Squadron Held Back Again

ORBETELLO, Italy, June 25. (Sunday)—(UP)—The departure of General Italo Balbo's squadron of 25 giant seaplanes on a projected flight across the ocean to the Chicago exposition was postponed early today until Monday because of bad weather over the Alps.

The postponements came after lunch baskets had been made ready and additional fuel poured into the silvery Savoia-Marchetti's apparently in preparation for a takeoff at dawn. Gen. Italo Balbo, Italian air minister and leader of the flight, ordered the postponement on the basis of the elaborate weather reports made available to the armada.
