

MODOC CAMP BOYS HAVE ACTIVE LIFE

The president's civilian conservation corps army is at work in earnest on the Modoc national forest. Rodent control, insect control, fire hazard reduction and half a dozen other different activities were to keep the boys from becoming homesick.

At the Crane creek camp the construction of a forest service telephone line from that place and on to the town of Davis Creek is under way. The same camp is engaged in the construction of a road up Lassen creek and a wide fire line to protect the green timber and young pine plantations in the Sugar Hill area.

From the Crane creek, as well as from the Hackmore camp, several parties of C. C. men under the supervision of their foremen are engaged in poisoning ground squirrels on the mountain meadows and large sagebrush flats. The boys with their small sacks of poisoned grain resemble a skirmish line strung out over the flat country. A stub camp for rodent control operations has been established on Tom's creek near the old Marlett sawmill site.

Local men are inclined to laugh at the "tenderfoot" from the cities, as in the case of one boy who found a lizard in the trunk out over the flat country. He announced brought a crowd of the city boys running to the spot, armed with every conceivable weapon—to destroy this monster of the woods.

Church services are being arranged for by the local clergymen at all of the C. C. camps. The men gather for divine service in the recreation hall which is a feature of each one of the camps.

Tough luck for the married men is contained in an edict which has gone forth from headquarters to the effect that no women are to be allowed to reside in C. C. camps.

Army mess kits are fairly capacious affairs but the average youngster in the local camps thinks nothing of coming back for the second or third helping. There is no limit to the amount of food any man can get, within the limits of his own capacity. The food is excellent, of wide variety and well cooked.

All the summer ranger force of the Modoc national forest assumed duty last week. Some of the men will be stationed in the conservation camps, each one of which will have an organized fire suppression crew under the leadership of a forest guard, ready for an instant's get-away in case of a fire call.

Many of the youngsters in the C. C. camps here never have been off the city streets before. Life in the mountains, coupled with good food and regular habits is working wonders for many of them.

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HIGH PRICES BOOM ON WHEAT MARKET

CHICAGO, June 24, (AP)—Enthusiasm for higher prices blazed furiously in all the speculative pits on the board of trade today, with wheat soaring a maximum of 3 1/2c.

May wheat, in which trading formally commences Monday, crossed to above 90c today. Persistent abnormally hot temperatures and dearth of adequate moisture brought in new floods of sensational crop damage, suggesting that United States grain yields this season would prove the smallest in 30 years.

Official advices indicated that Nebraska small grains were beyond redemption.

Wheat closed flurried, 2c to 2 1/2c above yesterday's finish; corn, 1c to 1 1/2c up; oats, 2 1/2c to 3c advanced, and provisions at a rise of 5c to 20c.

Before Killing

Beatrice Tupper, former wife of Benjamin Tupper, facing federal first degree murder charges in connection with the stabbing of Abin Murdock, June 13, on the Klamath Indian reservation, testified before U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas Saturday that she had purchased 12 bottles of homebrew beer the day of the murder from Rose Huff of Chiloquin.

Mr. Huff, Oklahoma Indian, was bound over to the federal grand jury Saturday morning, charged with selling and possessing intoxicating liquors on the Indian reservation. Her bond was set at \$2,500 and she was returned to the county jail until the bond is raised.

Mr. Tupper testified that the drinking of the beer culminated in drunkenness and murder of Murdock, her son-in-law.
