

BETTERS PICK JACK SHARKEY

Advantage of Experience Matched with Brawn Of Camera

NEW YORK, June 24. (UP)—Jack Sharkey, who spent the 10 best years of his life to gain the heavyweight boxing championship of the world, will risk his prize for the first time Thursday night in a bout with Primo Carnera of Italy in Madison Square Garden's vast Long Island bowl.

Despite the lesson taught by the recent Max Baer-Max Schmeling fight—that it's all-arms and legs that will win the younger, stronger, more ambitious man—the 32-year-old champion will climb through the ropes 15 to 5 favorite in the betting.

The odds furnish strong proof of the value boxing men place upon experience, for skill is the lone advance Sharkey will have.

Barney Ross Beats Canzoneri in Chicago Championship Bout

CHICAGO, June 24 (AP)—Barney Ross—born Bernard Rossosky 22 years ago—has ended the rule of Tony Canzoneri, one of boxing's grandest champions, over the world's lightweights.

Only three years away from amateur and golden gloves triumphs, the handsome Jewish youth from Chicago's ghetto, last night worked out just enough of a margin over the New York Italian after 10 rounds of bitter, vicious fighting, to win the 135-pound title.

The fight was so close that referee Tommy Gilmore called it a draw. However, the judges, Edward Hing and William A. Batty, figured that Ross' edge was enough to take the title away from Canzoneri.

The disappointed small crowd of 11,204 spectators expressed very definite disapproval of the verdict, but later cheered the home boy who had upset the fighter who has been characterized as the best in the world, pound for pound.

Canzoneri heard the decision with an expression of shocked amazement. His famous grin faded and was replaced by a look of bewilderment as he realized that the title he won three years ago from Al Singer and defended against Kid Chocolate, Billy Petrolle and Jack (Kid) Berg, had been taken from him.

The new champion, nervous and fidgety as he awaited the verdict, capered about the ring in his happiness as he heard himself proclaimed.

After an experimental first round, Canzoneri, making Ross fight almost as he wished, went right out after a knockout. He battered the young Chicagoan about with stinging rights to the head and jaw, but could not make him hold still for a knockout punch. Ross, however, was following instructions, and even when tempted to slug with the cringing, bobbing titleholder, refrained until the seventh round.

By that time Canzoneri had built up a respectable lead. Apparently figuring that Ross was as tired as himself, and that his lead would stand, the champion started to coast. Ross was on him like a hawk, firing steaming left hooks into his face and scoring with his right. Canzoneri, trying but still cunning, attempted to slow Ross down in the eighth by tying him up after brief exchanges, only to have the youngster pile in with both hands, outscore him and make him miss.

Inspired by his success in the seventh, eighth and ninth, Ross let go with everything in the final stand. Canzoneri almost matched him, but was just short of gaining an even break.

Canzoneri was guaranteed 40 per cent of the receipts, amounting to around \$18,000. Ross fought for much less.

KLAMATH MEETS COQUILLE TEAM

Pelicans Have Chance To Throw Standings Into Tie

An opportunity to take command of the Southern Oregon league will come to the Klamath Pelicans Sunday against the undefeated leaders from Coquille. The game will be played at the Fairgrounds at 2:00 o'clock.

Prisco Edwards, Klamath's playing manager, has had his squad out for two practices this week. Both the hitting and field strength have improved sufficiently to rate the Pelicans evenly with the leaders.

The Pelicans have lost but one league game this year and have decisively defeated Ashland and Eagle Point. Medford and Coquille remain the only teams not played thus far on the schedule.

Lefty Molatore, star southpaw of the league, probably will start the game for the Pelicans with Edwards catching. Molatore was credited with the single defeat, but at the same time has hurled a no-hit, no-run game this year.

A victory for Klamath will throw the standings into a tie. If Medford wins its contest over Eagle Point, then four teams will be tied for the leadership.

Paul Thill, still to be beaten here, will fight Elmer Brown, St. Paul, in the main event fight. Brown easily knocked out Spider Fields of Medford in his Klamath Falls.

Ad Cadena, the veteran Mexican boxer from Los Angeles, will meet Jack Willis, Klamath negro, in the semi-windup. Cadena lost to Willis in a brilliant bout several weeks ago.

Perry Houston, the dancing negro featherweight, has been matched against Spider Fields, in the third of the six-round fights.

Lillard probably will announce two preliminaries early next week.
