Slow Balls Pitched

Pitchers had difficulty in keeping the mud-laden ball in the groove over home plate. Fielders had just as much trouble in keeping the ball from rolling back. The game was not taken seriously with the advent of rain. Pitchers were unable to show their stuff, and managed only to pitch slow balls.

Coquille team returned defeated for the first time during the season. Medford remained the only team the Pelicans have not met in the district matches.

Second Place Winners Know Giants, Senators

The second place clubs in the major leagues are learning by painful experience that if they give the New York Giants or Washington Senators an inch in the pennant races they'll take a mile.

The Giants, after picking up a half game Saturday, stepped out yesterday while the St. Louis Cards were having a day off and added another full game to their margin by taking two decisions from the Cincinnati Reds. The Senators, also winning twice, pulled out a game and a half in front of the New York Yankees who got only an even break with Detroit.

Washington Takes Two

Bill Terry's highly efficient pitching staff played its usual important part in downing the Reds 7-1 and 6-3 the improved hitting went along with it.

Washington took two games from the Cleveland Indians, 9-6 and 10-1. In its usual slugging style, The Senators battered out a total of 29 hits while Earl Whitehill helped out with five hits in the opener.

The Yanks carried on the opening battle against Detroit for 13 innings before an error by Frank Crosetti opened the way for the Tigers to win 6-5. The second game was halted by darkness after six innings and in that time Russell Van Atta gave only two hits and fanned seven to win 3-0.

Athletics Register

The St. Louis Browns were the day's other double winners, taking two games from Boston to draw up a half game behind the seventh place Red Sox. A six run rally in the eighth won the opener 10-4 and further heavy hitting brought a 4-4 triumph in the second game.

The Philadelphia Athletics registered a half-game gain on Cleveland by splitting a twin bill with the Chicago White Sox. Jimmie Fox, slugging his 16th home run in the tenth inning to win the second game for the A's 5-3 after an eighth inning outburst had brought the Sox all their runs for a 2-2 victory in the opener.

Boston Dances

Chicago's Cubs found their batting eyes in the first game against Boston and pounded their way to a 12-3 triumph with 18 hits, but they couldn't keep it up and Boston put over a ninth inning run against Charley Root to win the nightcap 4-2. Two best mound performances enabled Pittsburgh and Brooklyn to divide two games. Leon Chagnon limited the Dodgers to six hits while the Pirates won 6-2, then Walter Beck came back with a four-hit job and Brooklyn triumphed 9-1.

Portland lost ground in the pennant race by winning only five of its seven games at Seattle. Ben Shanley's home run with two aboard broke up a great 17-inning battle Saturday night and gave the Beavers a 7-4 win. Four-baggers by Freddie Miller and Mel Almada drove in five runs as the Indians won yesterday's opener 6-5. In the last half of the twin bill Art Jacobs checked the Seattle men with five hits 7-1.

One week-end triumph was enough to give Los Angeles its series with Hollywood 4-3. The Angels dropped the Saturday game 4-2, but came back to capture a 12-inning thriller yesterday, 10-9. Tom Sheehan washed the Angels in the 7-inning nightcap 7-5.

Seals Step Up

Suddenly come to life, the San Francisco Seals captured their first series since the opening week of the season by dropping the Mission in five of the seven games. The Reds scored their only victories during the week-end, Saturday 6-2, and the short nightcap yesterday, 6-5. Although out-hit 15-11 in the opener, the Seals made the most of their mistakes, errors to out score the Reds 9-7.

SHARKEY ODDS SHOW BIG DROP

Pre-Fight Speculation Shows Puzzling Aspects

NEW YORK, June 26 (AP)—If boxing matches were decided on the basis of bulk, Jack Sharkey could concede his heavyweight championship to Primo Carnera now and go home to Boston and take care of the flowers he likes to talk about.

But there's more to it than that, and unless Jack has turned overnight into one of those well-known "hollow shells" then he should be rated a strong favorite for his 15-round title defense against the big Italian in Madison Square Garden's outdoor bowl in Long Island City Thursday night.

Betting Odds Drop

One of the most puzzling aspects of pre-fight speculation has revolved around the betting odds. Sharkey was a 4 to 1 shot when he fought for the first time two years ago, the odds now have dropped to 7 to 5 with the possibility of a further shortening before champion and challenger climb through the ropes about 8:30 (E. S. T.) Thursday evening.

Sharkey, nearing 31, undoubtedly has lost some of his speed and by the same token Carnera has improved amazingly in the last two years, but the champion still looks like much the better fighting man. He'll have to concede 60 pounds in weight and seven inches in height but he did it before and gave Carnera a beating over the same long 15-round route.

Max Baer's spectacular 10-round knockout of Max Schmeling here June 8 has stimulated interest in the boxing industry in this section and the garden expects a turnout of about 60,000 fans and receipts of about \$350,000 this week.

William F. Carey, president of the garden, has announced there will be no broadcast of the bout.

U. S. TEAM STARTS POORLY IN MATCH

SOUTHPORT, Eng., June 26. (AP)—The United States Ryder Cup team led by Walter Hagen today started out poorly in defense of the international golf trophy, trailing in three of the four foursomes and only holding the Britons even in the other at the end of the first 18 holes of the 36-hole first matches.

Hagen and Gene Sarazen, former American and present British open champion, were three down to Percy Alliss and Chas. Whitcombe at the halfway mark. Olla Dutra and Demetre Shute were four down to Abe Mitchell and Arthur Havers and Ed Dudley and Bill Burke were behind A. H. Padgham and Alf Perry by the same margin.

Hagen Loses Touch

Craig Wood and Paul Runyan, the latter playing in his first international series, were the only Americans to hold the Britons in check, being all square with W. H. Davies and Syd Easterbrook at the end of 18.

Pace putting by the British and poor work on and around the greens was largely responsible for the sorry American showing.

Hagen, ordinarily one of the best putters in the world, lost his touch as did Shute and it was only excellent play by Sarazen and Dutra which kept them within halting distance of their rivals in the first two matches.

Ideal playing conditions prevailed.

The Americans never have the Ryder cup here and the Britons always have been badly beaten when they invaded the United States.

Corbett's Name Means Little To Holdup Bandits

CHICAGO, June 26, (AP)—The fighting name of Corbett didn't mean much to four bandits who robbed and kidnapped young Corbett, former holder of the welterweight boxing championship, and his wife, he told police.

The incident occurred yesterday as they were driving out of the city enroute to their home in Fresno, Calif., and resulted in the fighters' losing \$225 in cash and his wife two diamond rings she valued at \$500.

Corbett said that when he told the quartet who he was the leader merely smiled and said: "Where do you get that stuff? Corbett's dead."

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 26. (AP)—Billie Jean King, Jr., United States and Wimbledon tennis champion, today began defense of his title in the famous Wimbledon play with a 6-1, 6-2, 6-0 victory over G. R. D. Meredith, of England.

Cliff Satter, third ranking United States star, continued his straight-set American advance as he polished off E. Itoh, Japanese Davis Cup spare, 6-2, 5-6, 6-1 in another first round match.

David Jones, former Columbia University star and now the ranking player of Cambridge, was given a stiff contest by J. D. Patrick Wheatley, veteran English Davis Cup player, but finally prevailed 6-4, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3 to join Vines in the second round.
