Upsets in the Southern Oregon league Sunday have turned the race for a pennant into a complicated affair between three teams, Klamath Falls, Coquille and Roseburg. Medford, defeated Sunday by the heretofore weak Ashtland outfit, still has a chance to regain its prestige before the season closes.

Medford, still one of the strongest teams in the league despite its loss, will be in Klamath Falls next Sunday to match bats with Frisco Edwards' Pelicans at the fair grounds.

The Pelicans will fight to retain their high position in the league after losing to Coquille, undefeated through the early part of the season, in a wild contest last week end.

Roseburg continued to keep pace in the first division with a 7 to 1 victory at Eagle Point.

LILLARD MUSTERS OUTSTANDING CARD

In the third of the six-round fights Spider Fields, Medford, will tackle Klamath's game little negro, Perry Houston. Both men are fast and real punchers.

BRITISH GOLFERS TAKE RYDER CUP

SOUTHPORT, Eng., June 27. (AP)—Great Britain today regained possession of the Ryder Cup, emblem of Anglo-American professional golf rivalry, defeating the United States 6½ points to 5½, in two days' competition.

Syd Easterbrook, British pro, scored the deciding victory by defeating Denmore Shute, 1 up, 36 holes, as the climax of one of the most exciting international golf battles ever waged, with the outcome in doubt until the last hole of the final match was completed.

WIMBLEDON, England, June 27. (AP)—Mrs. Helen Wills Moody opened defense of her Wimbledon singles title today with a smashing love set victory over Mrs. J. P. Macrae, veteran British player, 6-0, 6-0.

Ellsworth Vines Jr., defending his Wimbledon title, today advanced to the third round with a four set victory, 6-1, 4-6, 7-5, 6-1, over A. T. Tegner, unranked British player.

H. W. (Bunny) Austin, one of the British favorites, eliminated the veteran Frenchman, Jacques Brugnon, 6-2, 3-6, 7-5, 6-0, in another second round feature.

Sac Senators Increase Lead In Fast-Moving Coast League

Nearing the halfway mark Tuesday, the 1938 Coast league pennant race was largely a matter of Sacramento against the field, with the high-flying Senators four games ahead of Portland and six games ahead of the second-place Hollywood Stars.

The Solons open their first series of the season at Seattle with a record of 21 victories in their last 29 starts. Since June 1 Earl McNeely's clouters have climbed from fourth to first place.

Portland returned home Tuesday after a three weeks road trip, clinched by a 5-2 series victory at Seattle last week. The Beavers oppose the Oaks, still shaken from their shattering at Sacramento. The Oaks have been slipping since they lost the league leadership at the end of April.

Oscar Eckhardt, Missoula outfielder and long the leading hit-

ter of the Pacific coast league, saw his advantage further reduced today with the circuit going into the half way mark of the season.

Eckhardt, despite something of a slump, continued to be the only player in the league, however, who was over the four hundred mark, with a .423 average for 84 games.

Jacobs In Front
The Mission club, with hitters in first, third and fourth places in the individual standings, was unable to hold first place in the team averages as Sacramento moved up with a collective mark of .318 to .317 for Mission.

With Fred Schulte on base, and in the eighth when Goose Goslin's triple and singles by Cronin and Blinze gave the leaders two more runs.

The Athletics got away to an early lead against the White Sox and then with big Jim Peterson pitching effective relief ball pounded out an 8 to 2 victory.

St. Louis Beaten
Peterson replaced Tony Freitas in the second inning with the bases filled. He allowed one run to score and then shut out the Sox the remainder of the way with five scattered hits. Meanwhile his teammates blasted Whitlow Wyatt from the mound and continued their heavy hitting of Joe Heving. The victory was the A's fifth in six games and the seventh defeat in their last eight games for the sale house.

With Dusty Rhodes keeping the Browns nine hits well scattered and pounding out four hits, including a pair of doubles, the Boston Red Sox defeated St. Louis 13 to 5.

The Yankees and Tigers failed to get into action when rain intervened while all of the games in the National league were washed out.

Washington Increases Lead In American To Two Games

While the Washington Senators have been hitting the ball to all corners of western ball parks in their march to the top of the American league, Manager Joe Cronin's pitchers also have been playing an important role in establishing a season's major league record for consecutive victories.

With a 4 to 3 triumph over the Cleveland Indians Monday, the Senators not only increased their lead to two full games over the idle Yankees but won their eighth successive game and their 15th in 18 starts.

Pitchers Effective
Just how effective Washington pitchers have been is shown in their record of allowing opposing teams only 65 hits and an average of 2.5 runs a game in the club's last eight triumphs.

In Monday's conquest, the third over the Indians, Alvin Crowder and Jack Russell held the tribe in check in all except the second inning. Oral Hildebrand, ace of the Cleveland mound staff, and Willis Hedin threatened the Senators except in the second inning, when Joe Kuhel blasted out a home run

BULLDOG JACKSON WINS AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27. (AP)—Bulldog Jackson of Klamath Falls won the main event of last night's wrestling matches here from Otis Clingman of Oklahoma City, but only after losing the last of four falls.

Jackson took the first fall with a hammerlock in 17 minutes. Clingman evened it up 14 minutes later with a flying Dutchman and a pin hold. In the third fall, Art O'Reilly of Eugene first awarded the tumble to Clingman, then reversed his decision and declared that Jackson won in 8 minutes with a Boston Crab hold.

Because of objections raised to the reversed decision, Promoter Herb Owen asked the two to return for another fall. Clingman was awarded this spilt in 3 minutes on a foul. But boxing commissioners, who also govern wrestling here, said the referee's decision awarding Jackson the third fall was final. Jackson weighed 155 and Clingman, 160.

SHARKEY READY TO MEET PRIMO

Champion Fit to Defend
Title Against Man
From Italy.

NEW YORK, June 27. (AP)—Primo Carnera may expect to catch Jack Sharkey out of condition when he steps into the ring of Madison Square Garden's Long Island City bowl Thursday night. But if he does, he'll run into an unpleasant surprise.

Better Than Ever
An examination by Dr. Vincent Nardiello of the medical staff of the New York state athletic commission, effectively disposed of the question of the champion's condition.

"Sharkey is in better shape physically and mentally," Dr. Nardiello said, "than he was when I examined him a year ago for his fight with Max Schmeling. His disposition is greatly improved. He was too much on edge last year, too nervous. Nervous exhaustion is more tiring than any amount of physical effort. I would say Sharkey is every bit as ready as Carnera."

Carnera Ends Training
Sharkey, as a matter of fact, never has looked better than he did yesterday in a sizzling two-round workout with Hans Birkie, rugged German warrior, at his training camp in Orangeburg, N. Y. The champion was punching viciously to the body with his right hand, snaking punches home with lightning speed, and twice shook up Birkie with left hooks that traveled only inches.

Carnera, meanwhile, wound up his intensive preparations at Pompton Lakes, N. J., by boxing three rounds with Harold Mayes and two against Arthur Huttick. Both found the huge Italian easy to hit, but hard to hurt. Competent boxing critics expressed surprise over Primo's improvement, especially in boxing skill.

Champion Favorite
Carnera plans no more boxing and will take only enough exercise until the night of the fight to keep himself at top condition. Sharkey expected to wind up boxing today.
