**BIDS RECEIVED**  
PORTLAND, June 28 — Bids considerably in excess of the estimates of the state highway engineer, reflecting the recent increase in prices, were received by the state highway commission here today.

On the Canby-Aurora section and north end Aurora-Brooks stretch, bid on, as a unit, the low proposal was \$175,560, submitted by the West Contract company of Portland. The low bid on the other unit, comprising the south end of the Aurora-Brooks section, was \$162,967, submitted by Parker Schram company of Portland.

**Portland Low**  
Asphaltic concrete was specified for paving the distance of 15.95 miles.

C. J. Montz of Portland placed the low bid of \$24,329 for construction of a bridge over the south fork of the Santiam river on the Albany-Lyons secondary highway.

For the bridge over Mill creek on The Dalles-Coast secondary road, O. N. Pierce of Portland was low at \$8,185.

C. F. Glessy. A petition signed by 800 residents of the district between Eugene and Creswell was filed. They argued that instead of moving the highway to eliminate the danger of flooding by high water, the Willamette river should be diked. The commission said there was no immediate prospect of a change, although a survey and further study be made.

**"Good Work" Praised**  
The commission was asked by a delegation from southern Oregon to continue its "good work" in modernizing the Pacific highway. The group represented the Pacific Highway association of southern Oregon, and pressed for immediate reconstruction of the Siskiyou section. Those who appeared were C. H. Demaray of Grants Pass, W. C. Harding of Roseburg, S. S. Smith of Medford, G. M. Green of Ashland and Howard Merriam of Gresham. County Judge Biggs of Crook county today renewed his petition for repairs to the Siskiyou section of the Oregon highway.

**Repeal Victor In Two States**

One third of the 48 states have now voted to strike the 18th amendment from the constitution.

West Virginia and California made the score 16 to 9 in favor of repeal when their voters returned majorities yesterday for the 21st amendment, which aims to delete the 18th.

**Twenty More Needed**

In West Virginia, a border state which had been dry for 20 years, the margin of the repeal victory was about 79,000 with approximately three-quarters of the ballots counted.

California, which had wiped its own prohibition law from the books last year, was giving repeal a lead of about 3 to 1 as tabulations poured in today.

Repealists must win 20 more states to delete prohibition from the constitution.

The states which have voted to ratify, besides West Virginia and California, are: New York, New Hampshire, Indiana, Connecticut, Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin, Rhode Island, Wyoming, New Jersey, Delaware, Nevada, Illinois and Massachusetts.
