DOLLAR WHEAT LOST IN REVERSE MARKET

CHICAGO, June 28, (AP)—Dollar wheat went into eclipse today, recent big upturn in prices being suddenly wiped out by sensational reverse market action.

Uncertainty attending the effect of quick application of the government's new process tax and farm bonus system was asserted in some quarters to be largely responsible for the upset of values.

All the grain markets, however, had been honeycombed with stop loss orders to sell on price setbacks, and as soon as these orders were dislodged, an avalanche of profit-taking sales carried the markets downstage, with wild rallies intervening, but failing to last.

Wheat closed wild, at almost the day's bottom prices, with all deliveries below \$1.00, and May contracts at \$0.92.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 28, (AP)—Buoyancy of the so-called "wet" issues aided the stock market to bear up fairly well during most of today's session, but an irregularly lower movement later developed in other groups coincident with a reaction in grains and another sharp slump of the dollar. Closing prices were mixed. Transfers approximated 5,800,000 shares.

The British pound spurted around 10 cents to another post-war high, and the dollar dropped to a value of around 75 cents in terms of European gold currencies. Cotton was heavy, and wheat and corn gave up most of yesterday's gains. There was some heavy profit taking in some of the recent share leaders, but the alcoholic division pushed forward for advances of 2 to around 10 points, until the last few minutes, when it yielded some of its advance.

Owens-Illinois glass succeeded National Distillers as the market leader, with a gain of 10 points. Others in the moist category up 1 to around 3 included U. S. Industrial Alcohol and National Distillers. Celanese was up 6. American Ice got up 4. Standard Brands around 3, and Drug, 4.
