INDIANS ARRAIGNED ON LIQUOR CHARGE

Two Klamath Indians and one Digger tribe Indian of California, now living on the Klamath reservation, were arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas Wednesday on charges of manufacturing and introducing intoxicating liquor onto the Klamath reservation.

Robert Weiser, 18, and Celsie Duffer, 17, both Klamaths living at Beatty, were arraigned with bonds being placed at \$1500 each. Both were returned to the county jail on failure to raise the bond.

Andrew L. Billie, Digger Indian, who is alleged to have purchased intoxicating liquor in Klamath Falls and returned it to the reservation asked that no bond be set and he would go directly before the federal grand jury.
