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because of the bad odor which followed his barnstorming tour of America, when second rate man after third rate man fell beneath the hammer of his fist. The story has been told too often to be repeated here.

But it must be taken into account that Primo doesn't quite grasp the manner in which fight managers operate in this country. He cleaned up something over \$300,000 on his tour and today is a bankrupt. He seems to be a fighting man, with no interest in the pot of gold that lies in success. They say of him that all he cares about is eating. His sole comment before the fight was: "I hope he won't rain."

A few days ago, when he was being questioned in connection with his bankruptcy petition, he revealed his feeling in the matter. To each question put to him concerning his earnings, his reply was: "I don't. I not interested. I not interested."

Had Big Start

The man mountain was born in Sequela, near Venice, and is said to have weighed 32 pounds at birth. In his early youth he worked at carpentry and the laying for his father. And at 14—already the size of a full grown man—he left home to make his living, wearing burlap bags wrapped around his feet.

He became a cement mixer in Paris and then joined a honky-tonk circus as "strong boy." He

bent bars across his chest, pitted his strength against horses and automobiles. Then Leon See, a boxing promoter, chanced to hear of his prodigious size and took him in tow. Primo won his first fight against a 200-pound second rater by knocking him out in the first round. That was in 1929.

After a brief fighting career in Europe, the future world champion's shrewd manager, See, betthought himself of the money that might be made by bringing Primo to this country. They arrived on December 31, 1929, and a small crowd which gathered at the pier ignored Gene Tanney, who had gone to meet Hugh Walpole, to cheer for the Italian giant.

There ensued a campaign of publicity which became almost as ridiculous as that which followed upon the arrival in this country of Zaro Agha, who claimed the age of 156 and habbed himself into national prominence.

Shave His Chest?

Primo's managers began capitalizing on his size without delay. They even had him getting a shave at John the Barber's tonorial cathedral at specified hours. Nobody knows whether the barber shop paid for the crowds Carnera attracted.

His managers as well as most of the sporting fraternity judged him for a paleoka from the start and Carnera was not recognized as a capable fighter until he stood up under Sharkey's lashing at Ebbets Field in October, 1931. After that he commanded a bit more respect.

Then came the unfortunate contest with Ernie Schaaf, who died after being knocked out by the mammoth Italian. Physicians have said Carnera was afflicted with glandular trouble and would die after his first good fight. They said he had vericose veins, and never could last. Psychologists have speculated on the effect his abnormalities have had on his mind. He showed 'em.

A few moments later, however, his wife called to him, received no answer and then discovered that he was dead. Arbuckle became known to millions the world over in the early days of pie-tossing comedy. He was reaping a fortune when in 1921 the death of Virginia Rappe, screen actress, followed a party in Arbuckle's suite in a San Francisco hotel. He was thrice tried and finally acquitted in connection with the case.

River Work Set

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29. (UP)—Oregon river and harbor projects involving expenditure of \$5,271,000 are recommended by army engineers to be included in the public works program, according to information received from Washington, D. C., tonight. Money is expected to be spent before July 1, 1934.

Projects listed include:

Columbia River mouth, \$1,500,000; Columbia and Lower Willamette, \$1,806,000; Willamette below Portland, \$500,000; Willamette above Portland \$165,000; St. Helens, channel, \$50,000.

In addition the engineers recommend spending \$700,000 on the Umpqua river project and \$30,000 on Coos Bay.
