

WORK STARTED TO RID REGION OF 'HOPPERS'

Although grasshopper infestations in the Klamath Basin are not as great as in previous years, according to C. A. Henderson, county agricultural agent, hoppers have appeared in a number of districts during the last 30 days.

Poisoning is being carried on in the Tule Lake district with funds borrowed by the bureau of reclamation, under the supervision of the county agent's office.

Other infestations have appeared in the vicinity of Round Lake, Swan Lake, Upper Klamath Marsh, Fort Klamath and other tracts on the Upper lake.

Poison is being distributed over virtually all of these districts by land owners, under the supervision of the county agent.

Serious in Marsh

The infestation is more serious in the marsh area, the agriculturalist declares, and no funds are available to carry on a poisoning campaign.

A new method of control is being tried, however, and between 4,000 and 5,000 young turkeys have been located on the bad egg beds, where the hoppers hatch. The turkeys will be kept there all summer, and their owners, Griffin and Reynolds of Colorado, believe that they will make a nice profit from the birds, and clean out the grasshoppers without cost to landowners.

Griffin and Reynolds have tried the same plan with turkeys in high areas in Colorado, where they have cleaned out pests of crickets and hoppers.

Brought From Valley

The turkeys at present feeding on the marsh egg beds were procured in Junction City, Ore., and sent to the infested district.

Sea gulls are also contributing in the fight on hoppers, Henderson stated, and thousands have moved in on an infested area on Lower Klamath lake, and are feeding on the pests as fast as they hatch. Gulls are also assisting in the fight on hoppers at Tule Lake.

K. Sugarman's Get Shipments In Wooden Boxes

The K. Sugarman store, subscribing to the campaign, fostering the use of wood, has received a number of shipments of goods packed in wooden boxes. The shipments were received from concerns on the coast, the middlewest and in the east.

BRANCH BANK RULE ISSUED BY ATTORNEY

SALEM, June 30. (AP) — National banking associations must obtain the approval of the state superintendent of banks for the establishment of branch banks in the state of Oregon, Attorney General L. B. Van Winkle held in an opinion handed down late yesterday.

"Restrictions imposed by state law upon the location of state banks applies equally to the location of branch national banks," the opinion reads.

Investigation to Proceed.

"Before any branch is established the board of directors of any bank or trust company desiring to establish such branch shall make application therefor to the superintendent of banks. Such application shall be filed and published and shall be investigated and approved or disapproved by the superintendent of banks, and shall be subject to appeal to the state banking board, all in the same manner as is provided in the case of the organization of a bank or trust company."

"No bank or trust company shall establish or operate any branch or branches without first receiving the written approval of

OREGON'S FIRST HORSE RACE SET

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30. (AP) — The first horse racing meet in Oregon under the legalized betting law enacted by the last legislature, will open July 21 at Gresham on the Multnomah county fair track. The meetings will be staged by William P. Kynes, San Francisco promoter, who has been granted a permit by the Oregon racing commission for two 26-day sessions.

The first meeting will start July 21 and will run through, exclusive of Sundays, to August 12. The second will begin Sept. 8 and will be concluded Sept. 29.

It was said here today that it is likely that J. Burke Clements of Helena, Mont., will associate with Bert Bagley in conducting a 26-day meeting at Vancouver, Wash., following the Gresham dates.

SHELL LAUNCHES SALES CAMPAIGN

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30. — Announcing the launching of a new product and the inauguration of a comprehensive advertising and sales promotion campaign in eight western states, Hawaii and British Columbia, G. Leigh-Jones, president of Shell Oil company, today hailed President Roosevelt's leadership and the Industrial Recovery Act, reiterating his words of a year ago that "the way to regain prosperity is to deserve it and to deserve it calls for confidence, vigorous effort and cooperation."

Speaking to thousands of employees in Shell's second annual radio convention, President Leigh-Jones used a network of 14 radio stations to praise President Roosevelt's "encouragement of industry" and to declare that his company's recognition of the need for aggressive action a year ago had put more men and money to work at that time and placed Shell "a jump ahead of the field" in capitalizing now on the opportunity created by the administration's "New Deal."

Squirrel Poisoning Season Nearing End

The end of the squirrel poisoning season is rapidly approaching, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson, and all land owners are urged to poison the noxious rodents during the next few days, as they will soon go into hibernation for the fall and winter.

Immediately before their hibernation they eat only succulent, soft, green food and drink a great deal of water, refusing to eat the poisoned oats.

In the higher elevations the squirrels will not hibernate quite so early, and poisoning may be continued longer in these localities.
