BOSTON WART SHOWS FAIR WOOL DEMAND

BOSTON, June 30, (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "Demand for wool has been of fair proportions, everything considered this week. Prices have not been marked up materially, but the trend of the market is against the buyer. "Manufacturers are not pressing goods for sale any more. In fact, they are allowing deliveries and buyers are eager to get their commitments. Sales for the more remote months are not heavy. There is reluctance on the part of the manufacturers for the time being to quote far ahead, on account of the new season's tax and the question of labor costs in the matter of wages and working hours. "The new clip is well cleared from the west, except for some wools which are held at prices that dealers now consider prohibitive. "Foreign markets are very strong, and for the week a bit higher once more. Advances of 15 to 25 per cent are predicted in London, Tuesday next, medium crossbreds being the strongest feature of the market." The Bulletin will publish the following quotations: Scoured basis—Oregon, fine and fine medium staple, 70c to 72c; fine and fine medium French combing, 67c to 68c; fine and fine medium clothing, 62c to 65c; Valley No. 1, 63c to 65c. Mohair—Oregon, 23c to 23c; domestic graded, first combing, 35c to 40c; second combing, 30c to 35c; third combing, 27c to 30c; fourth combing, 23c to 25c; carding, 27c to 29c; first kid, 60c to 63c; second kid, 50c to 53c. Hogs, 200; market for light butchers, 10c higher. Good, 140 to 200 lbs., \$4.35 to \$4.85; 200 to 250 lbs., \$4.25 to \$4.85; over 250 lbs., \$3.30 to \$5.00. Country, 14c to 16c. Pigs, good, \$2.75 to \$3.25. Sheep, 100; market steady to firm. Lambs, good and choice, \$5.25 to \$5.75; common and medium, \$4.50 to \$5.25. Wethers, \$2.00 to \$4.00. Ewes, \$1.50 to \$2.25.

NEW YORK, June 30, (AP)—Financial markets felt a little better today despite currency stabilization uncertainties, which tended to slow down the recent fast trading pace. Rallyes in the rails, mining and specialties equities gave stocks a firm appearance at the close, with gains in a number of issues ranging from 1 to 2 or more points. Turnover dwindled to approximately 2,500,000 shares. While the dollar only a little more than held its own in foreign exchange markets, expectation of some announcement from London on an agreement to curb speculation engendered an attitude of caution in share dealings. Gains rallied fairly well after earlier uneasiness, but cotton showed little enthusiasm. Bar silver improved fractionally, and secondary bonds recovered. Today's closing prices:

CHICAGO, June 30, (AP)—With a broad buying movement sweeping into the speculative pits late today, wheat kited to
