

Oregon State Coaching Staff Named

Beavers Get Ready for Big Season in Athletics. Lonnie Stiner Heads Football Department. New Men Added. Paul Thill Must Work at Fight Business.

This week athletic officials at Oregon State college selected a complete roster of coaches and settled down to the activity of preparing for a vigorous campaign this coming season on the sport fields of the Pacific coast conference.

It will be an exciting year for the Beavers. Young men— young men who have graduated from the ranks of the Orange varstiles—will take a hand in leading this often beaten college back along the difficult paths to almost forgotten championships.

The Beavers will turn their efforts to build victorious teams in four major sports— baseball, basketball, football and track. With the exception of a brilliant triumph in basketball, it has been year upon year since the Beavers captured the supremacy in any one sport. Like Oregon, Oregon State has had a weary road in its athletics.

One young man who was not graduated from the Corvallis school will top the coaching staff. This will be robust Lonnie Stiner, the giant Nebraskaer who served Paul J. Schisler as assistant football coach for eight long seasons. Stiner was obscured by Schisler overpowering dominations, but now it is he who is on top and the Beavers look forward to succeed under a newer and younger leader.

Bill Jim Dixon, a line man who used to rip the offense and defensive of conference teams a few seasons back, will be Stiner's chief aide on the football squad. Dixon, a member of the Oregon State staff since 1927, will be head man for the line.

George Scott will be a newcomer to the varsity backfield staff. He played for the Beaver backfield in 1926 and 1927 and then Schisler gave him a small job as backfield assistant in 1928. Until this year, he has coached Baker high school in eastern Oregon and established a noteworthy reputation in interscholastic athletics.

Scott will be a busy man at Corvallis, for his duties also include the head coaching job for freshman baseball and basketball.

"Slats" Gill—Armory T. Gill—the high-powered basketball man who took the coast title away from Southern California last spring, of course, will be back on the court next winter to try and duplicate his last season's success.

Gill, too, has a new job. This season he will replace Vera Eilers as the freshman football coach. Eilers succeeded Grant at Baker high.

Scott Swan will be another new director on his Orange staff. Swan was graduated from Oregon State way back in 1922, and has always been considered one of the finest trackmen turned out by the veteran Dad Butler, now at Detroit university. Since Stiner will be active with his all-year football job, Swan will take over the varsity track team.

He will also serve as trainer in all departments. In track he will find an admirable assistant in Jim Dixon, Rook coach for the last two years.

Elmer Brown's victory does not mean Paul Thill is through as a promising fighter. Thill has ability, but he does need some one to smooth him over. However strong his right hand and however strong his talent for snapping off punishment, he can never be an attractive boxer until he is slightly rebuilt.

Fighters have two things to accomplish before they can manage any sort of success. First, they must win, and Thill has a long way along this line; second, they must fight interestingly, and here the Dutchman has failed completely.

This young Dutchman must be taught how to hit accurately and squarely; he must forget to maul and wrestle and absolutely ruin a good fight from the spectator's standpoint. The spectator, to the fighter, is the bread-winner and he must be satisfied.

Thill can have a fair future if he can get someone who can show him something about the business of fighting.

HOMER BREAKS UP MOUND DUEL

Giants Lose to Cardinals In Close Contest; Solons Win

The "Indian star" which the St. Louis Cardinals hold over the New York Giants this season is standing them in good stead in their efforts to regain the National league lead.

The Cardinals haven't lost a game to the Giants this year, winning their seventh straight by a 1-0 count Friday when John Medwick broke up a mound duel between Dizzy Dean and Hal Schumacher by pasting a home run after two were out in the ninth. Thanks to Medwick's blow, the Cards now trail the pace setting Giants by only 2 1/2 games.

Senators Win For 2-3 Innings, Schumacher had the best of the mound duel, giving only three hits to six off Dean, but the Giants couldn't get him a run.

Meanwhile, the Washington Senators again pulled away in the American league race, breaking their tie with the New York Yankees in the ninth, Tony Lazzeri's 2-1 count while the Yanks "blew" a 13-12 decision to the Cleveland Indians.

Brilliant fielding marked the Senator-Tiger tilt as Al Crowder and Tommy Bridges fought it out on the hill. A walk, a force out, Heinie Manush's single and Goose Goslin's fly brought in the winning run in the seventh. The Yanks pounded out a 9-2 lead in three innings but finally succumbed to a four-run Indian rally in the ninth, Tony Lazzeri's error hurting plenty.

Phillies, Braves Victors The Phillies and the Boston Braves continued their sensational winning streaks in the National league. The Phils banged Larry French for four hits to score three runs in the ninth and a 5-4 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Braves slapped Red Lucas and Allyn Stout for 13 hits to beat the Cincinnati Reds 9-2 for their fifth straight victory as Wally Berger contributed his 14th homer.

The Brooklyn Dodgers cut loose behind Van Mungo's seven hit flinging and pounded out a 6-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

The Boston Red Sox sent Chicago down into a fourth place tie with Cleveland in the American league by defeating the Pale Hose 4-2 behind Henry Johnson's four hit flinging.

The Philadelphia Athletics and St. Louis Browns slugged it out for four hours and 25 minutes in a doubleheader that produced 63 hits, including Jimmie Fox's 20th home run. They wound up all square as the Browns won the opener 12-11 and Philadelphia the nightcap, 11-7.

HAVERFORD, Pa., July 1. (UP)—Jack Tidball of the University of California at Los Angeles, ranking player in the tournament, won the national intercollegiate lawn tennis championship here today in a cautiously played match from J. T. Murphy of Hamilton, 8-6, 7-7, 8-6.

Murphy seeded No. 3 matched the Pacific coast star in everyting except the service. Here Tidball had enough edge to win. The games followed service for the most part, Tidball having his broken twice and crashing through Murphy's five times.
