Mayor Praises New Gasoline

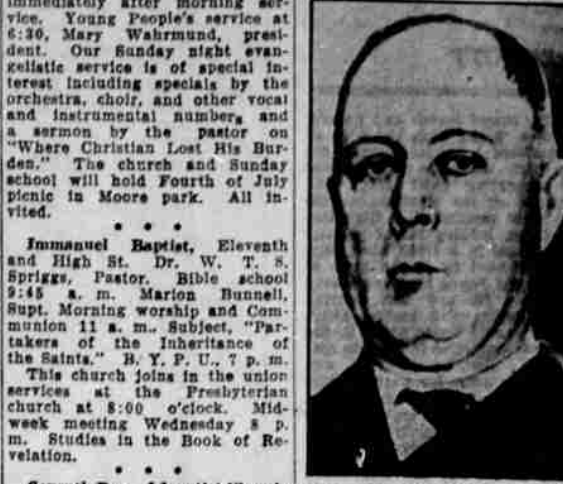
