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WHEAT GOES UP 4 CENTS ON SATURDAY

CHICAGO, July 1. (AP)—Sensational crop estimates by a woman did much to set grain markets on fire today and whirled wheat up 4 cents a bushel.

Mrs. Eileen H. Miller was the woman, and special significance was attached to her figures because she was two days in advance of other leading grain statisticians in making July 1 crop estimates, and also because she has been surprisingly frequent in accurately anticipating government forecasts. The miller reports today suggested that the aggregate yield of the five major grains in the United States this season would probably be the smallest in 30 years.

Wheat closed strong, 23c-30c above yesterday's finish, corn 1 1/2c-2c up, oats 2c-2 1/2c advanced, and provisions varying from 10c decline to an equal gain.
