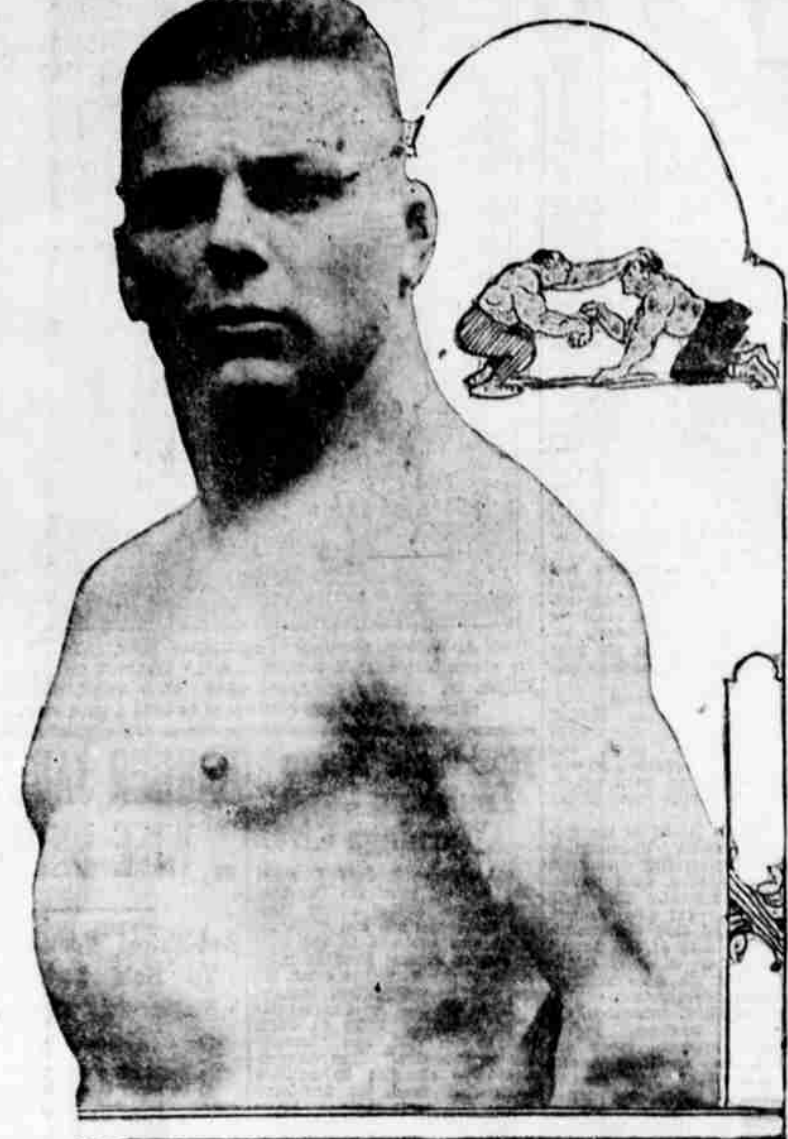
Each was two strokes under par for the new course, with Bill Burke, Greenwich, Conn., just behind at 72, and other Americans making a strong showing.

117 READY FOR BRITISH OPEN

Irish Bill Nolan Leads Pack; Two Yankees Up Among 'Em

(By The Associated Press) ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 4. (AP)—A field of 117 of the world's finest golfers, headed by Bill Nolan, veteran Irish campaigner from Portmarnock, qualified today for the British open golf championship.

Nolan broke the record for the old St. Andrews course by becoming medalist with an aggregate of 135. The new record was 67, and it clipped a stroke from the long standing mark of Bobby Jones and George Duncan, veteran English pros.

Gets Low Score Nolan's two day total was four strokes lower than that of his nearest rival, Horton Smith, young Chicago professional, who added a 71 today to a similar score yesterday, for an aggregate of 142.

Then came another Irish pro, Sidney Fairweather of Malton; Billy Burke of Greenwich, Conn., former U. S. open champion, and Ernest Kenyon of Devon, all of whom had 146.

TURNER WINS U. S. TITLE FOR SPEED

(By The Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, July 4. (AP)—Lieutenant Colonel Roscoe Turner, famous California pilot, won the American speed championship today in capturing the Dutch Thompson trophy race, crowning event of the 1933 national air races.

Jimmy Wedell, pilot and airplane designer of Patterson, La., and Turner's closest competitor, was second while Leo Gohlback of Detroit finished third in the six plane event.

Wedell had the satisfaction of seeing his Wedell-Williams ship win the first three places. Turner was disappointed in his attempt to set a new record for the race.

Turner's average time was 241.051 miles an hour, some 10 miles short of the mark of 252.033 set by James H. Doolittle in winning the 1932 race.

Earlier in the day Turner made a second futile attempt to exceed Doolittle's land record of 294.94 miles an hour on a straight course, but his best average was 284.

NEW YORK, July 4. (AP)—Boxing circles freely predicted today that all will be quiet on the heavyweight front until February when Jack Dempsey plans a return bout between Max Schmeling and Max Baer.

At first it had been thought Primo Carnera might defend his title this fall in Rome against Max Schmeling, but he is tied down to Madison Square Garden for one more fight.

Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's manager, at first favored the Italian bout but now wants a return bout with Baer, the victor to qualify for a championship fight with Carnera next summer.

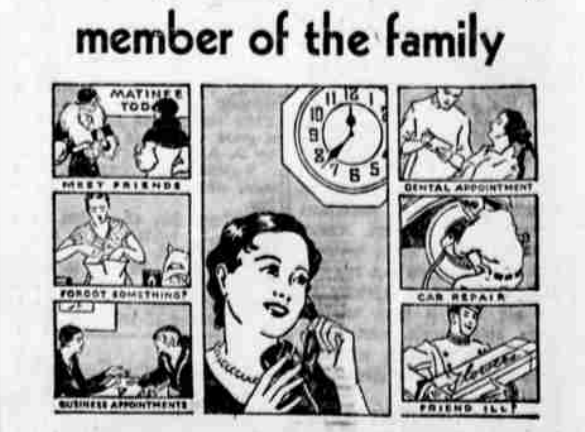
