

OREGON HAS HER GIANT TREES, TOO

SALEM.—Californians may have their big redwoods, but Oregon can claim the native Douglas fir as far from a shrub. Something about big trees learned at the state forester's office brought out that a Douglas fir, felled near Vancouver, B. C., some 20 years ago, was said to have been 417 feet high with a stump diameter of 25 feet. Although the height was not officially established, a photograph is proof of the trunk girth.

"In height, the outstanding species are the redwoods, Douglas fir, and the eucalyptus of Australia," said Forester Cronmiller.

"In basal diameter, the redwoods are preeminent as a class, although certain individual trees of other species appear to exceed them. And for volume, supremacy lies between the Kauri and California redwood."

The tallest eucalyptus of authentic measurement was a mountain ash, 346 feet high. The tallest known redwood is still standing in Bull Creek flat, measuring between 359 and 368 feet.

"Contrary to general opinion, the Douglas fir seems to hold supremacy over the redwood," said Cronmiller. "A felled Douglas fir which measured 350 feet by a steel tape was reported in 1890."

"The great cypress at St. Maria del Tule, Mexico, has a diameter at the ground of 49 feet and is 150 feet high. The Jaculilla tree in Brazil measures up to 22 feet in diameter and 150 feet high."

"The banyan has many trunks and spreads over an immense area like a forest. One tree on the Nerbudda river, western India, measures 2000 feet high in circumference of its manifold trunks, 350 large and 200 small ones. A famous banyan in the Calcutta botanical gardens has a main trunk 50 feet in circumference and 200 manifold trunks."

"A kauri tree of New Zealand is said to have the greatest volume, 2,220,000 board feet. It is 22 feet in diameter, 100 feet to the first branch, and the top is like a feather duster."

"Recently, a redwood tree was found in Big Lagoon, Humboldt county, Calif., which scaled 361,366 feet of merchantable lumber, enough to build 22 average homes."

ORDERS SENT

WASHINGTON, July 4 (UP)—President Roosevelt tonight transmitted to Secretary of State Hall, chief of the American delegation to the world economic conference, detailed instructions designed to prevent collapse of the conference.

Scarcely had Mr. Roosevelt returned to the White House from Annapolis, where early this evening he completed a three weeks vacation upon disembarkment from the cruiser Indianapolis, than he began hold efforts to salvage the confused London conference.

Journalism in the face of a rising tide of resentment against President Roosevelt's abrupt message to the conference yesterday, rejecting the gold bloc currency demands. They sought to prevent breaking up of the conference to prevent blame for its failure being placed on America.

One American delegate commented: "We've given the bureau 40 hours more to decide on whose doorstep the conference baby will be placed."

The United States delegation itself was divided, however, over whether the economic conference should be kept alive or not. It awaited new instructions from the president as to whether he considered it possible at this late date—the parley is going through its fourth week without achievements—to propose a new program.

Picturesque Lodge Sold To Prominent California Resort Owners Monday



ROCK CREEK, July 2.—Point Comfort, picturesque lodge building and forty acres of land owned by Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Fleishacker, San Francisco, located on Upper Klamath Lake near Rocky Point on the Rock Creek road, has been sold to Mr. and Mrs. William Freese, Los Angeles, well known resort managers of the Pacific coast region according to announcement made by R. H. Bosse, manager of the Klamath Development company, Monday.

Mr. and Mrs. Freese arrived Sunday.

The new owner, originally of Virginia and known throughout California as the man who put Hollywood on the map sees exceptional resort possibilities in Southern Oregon with its numerous lakes and densely wooded areas. The new resort will be conducted on a southern plan with colored help and Mr. Freese will retain the name Point Comfort.

Grounds in the vicinity of the lodge are to be landscaped and a garage will be built to accommodate ten or more cars. A boating pier is to be placed and a stable for riding horses will be maintained. It is planned to operate a sight seeing bus to all points of interest in connection with other recreational interests Mr. Freese stated.

Work on the project is expected to be completed in time for an early opening date in 1934.

Mr. and Mrs. Freese returned to Los Angeles Monday but will return in the near future.

The youth expressed an opinion that his father was realizing the ultimate in gambling by negotiating with the kidnapers for his own release on condition that he would pay ransom later.

"And dad never broke his word to anybody," said young Factor, in advancing the theory.

Since the kidnapping, young Factor has received at least two telephone calls from persons who said they were the kidnapers. He expressed a belief that the calls were genuine and indicated that the ransom demand had been reduced from \$150,000 to \$75,000.

Jerome himself was kidnapped last April and held for eight days. At that time, his father said he wished the kidnapers had taken him instead of the son as he would have known better what to do. Jerome expressed confidence that his father was making good on that boast.

Police and other prominent friends of Factor pointed tonight to the collapse of Mrs. Factor as proof that the kidnapping was genuine. Rumors previously had been spread that the millionaire gambler might have brought about his own disappearance in order to escape hearings in connection with efforts of the British government to extradite him. Factor has been charged with swindling British subjects of \$7,000,000 in a stock scheme and has been fighting extradition for months.

Another discredited rumor was that the purpose of the kidnapping had been to take Factor to Canada, where the British government could arrest and hold him.

A "board of strategy," composed of 12 of Factor's close personal and business friends, remained in session at a Loop hotel, the same from which Factor carried on negotiations in April for his son's release and, reportedly, outwitted the kidnapers by issuing false reports which led the gangsters to believe they were being double-crossed by their own members and to release the youth without payment of ransom.

Police officials still believed that Factor was in the hands of the Touhy gang, a group known as being much "tougher" than

the old Capone gang ever was. The officers believed that another gang, composed largely of youths, kidnaped Jerome Factor last April and that the gang of older men kidnaped the father.
