

35 DIED OVER UNITED STATES DURING MONTH

CHICAGO, July 5 (AP)—Thirty-five deaths and hundreds of injuries were recorded throughout the nation during Independence Day celebrations, a United Press survey indicated last night.

In Chicago four were dead by drowning and one died of injuries when a giant firecracker exploded.

At Marion, Ind., a father was killed when the plane his son was piloting fell.

Many Drown
In the San Francisco area four were killed in automobile accidents and one met death by drowning.

In Washington one drowned and a child of five was killed by a fall into an elevator shaft while watching a parade.

In Kansas City a girl drowned when she leaped overboard from a river excursion boat when her partner refused to dance with her.

Four members of a family were killed in Los Angeles when their automobile collided with a train. Another man was killed in a traffic crash.

Lightning Kills
In Wyoming one was killed in a traffic accident and another struck by lightning.

Colorado added to the fatalities with a suicide.

At Boise, Ida., two men were killed in an airplane crash and a 4-year-old boy was killed in an automobile collision.

An Oregon reported three deaths in automobile crashes and two by drowning.

At Milwaukee, Wis., more than on hundred persons were treated for firecracker burns.

In Texas one was killed by a firecracker, another in a plane crash and two in automobile accidents.

4-L PLANS WAGE INCREASE SOON

PORTLAND, Ore., July 4 (AP)—W. C. Ruegnitz, president of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, said today a new wage increase will become effective in 4-L operations about August 1. If the 4-L recommendations under the industrial recovery act are approved.

An increase in the minimum wage scale to 32 1/2 cents an hour for common labor became effective July 1 in 4-L camps and mills, and is generally being accepted by non-organization operators, Ruegnitz said. Before this increase became effective some mills were paying as low as 25 cents.

30 Cents Aim
The present rate will be increased to 43 cents an hour as soon as the government accepts the industry's code, Ruegnitz said. A 35-hour week with provisions to care for seasonal and other operating conditions, has been recommended.

"The 4-L wants to see a scale based on at least 50 cents an hour," the president of the group said. "To become effective just as soon as the industry can adjust itself to the new deal."

Body Found Along Willamette Bank

SALEM, July 4 (AP)—No identification had been made today of a disfigured body found Saturday on the west bank of the Willamette river here.

It was not the body of Gus Ingram who disappeared from the Oregon coast June 26, Deputy Coroner Thomas of Polk county said today. Thomas said the corpse had teeth while Ingram wore plates.

The body was five feet, five inches tall and was shot through the breast. Officers declared it a suicide.

Reedsport Bank In Receivership

SALEM, July 4 (AP)—The First Bank of Reedsport today was in the hands of the state banking department for liquidation, it was announced by A. J. Schuchman, superintendent of state banks. The bank has been operating on a 5 per cent restricted basis since the bank moratorium. The \$10,000 unrestricted deposits were transferred to the Coos Bay National Bank of Marshfield. Deposits on the restricted basis at the last call was \$42,000.

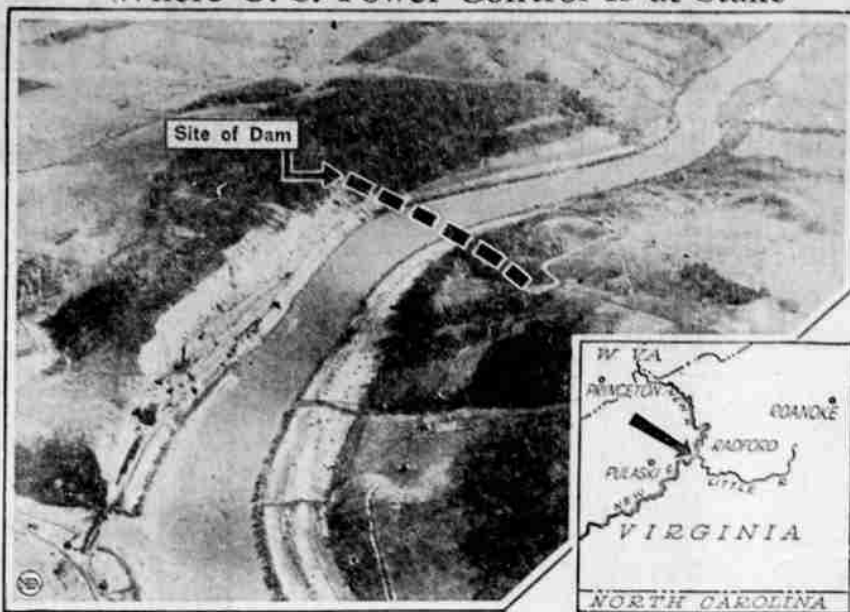
Salmon Cargoes Unload At Astoria

Trollers along the North Pacific coast are delivering all fish here as the result of disinclination of Seattle buyers to meet their price demands which call for a two-cent differential for deliveries at Seattle, as compared with delivery at Astoria.

BOY FRIENDS TAKE PLACE OF MOTHERS

CHICAGO, July 5 (AP)—When a girl enters college her trusted confidant is her mother but by the time she has finished, it's usually her boy friend, the nation's teachers were told at their annual convention yesterday.

This is the finding of Opal Lynn, a research worker of Iowa State college, who told the sociological section of the National Education association of her efforts to discover how a girl's ideas and attitudes change during college life. The study was made at Iowa state.

"Mother Knows Best"
"Freshman girls confide most often in their friends," said Miss Lynn, "but they prefer their mother as a confidant. When they are seniors, however, the boy friend tends to be the recipient of their confidences."

She told of other changes that four years of college life brings. Freshmen girls wanted to have a career followed by marriage. Senior girls had dropped the career idea and wanted marriage most of all. However, half the older girls believed that a career and marriage could be carried on successfully at the same time whereas the percentage for young girls was smaller.

Would Change Homes
One of the most marked changes was in respect to their homes. Senior girls wanted to make twice as many changes in their homes as did freshman girls.

The students were asked what influences had brought about these changes and responded that it had been their contacts with instructors and friends. Books also played a vital role in changing their character of the girls. More than half the seniors said that their lives had been changed by their reading while only a fourth of the freshman girls admitted that reading influenced them.

The biggest worries that the freshmen girls were studying and studying. But the seniors worried more about money than study and the percentage was reversed for the freshmen.

The old belief about blushing and bashful freshmen girls was contradicted by Miss Lynn's study. She found almost as many senior girls who felt ill at ease in the presence of others as freshmen. Less than a third of the freshmen never felt ill at ease. More than a third of the seniors were similarly self-assured.

Pickford, the palatial home where they have lived and entertained royalty, is for sale.

This announcement from "America's Sweetheart" herself left Hollywood stunned today, although rumors of a separation had been current and had been denied for more than two years.

These reports said that Fairbanks had urged his wife to sell their palatial home. He wanted to cultivate the friendship of the nobility in Europe, they said, while she preferred to remain with her friends in motion pictures, which had brought her success.

Miss Pickford's statement was brief: "If there should be a divorce, the grounds will be incompatibility. A separation between Douglas and me is contemplated and Pickford is for sale."

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SENATE, HOSPITAL SAME TO BORAH

BALTIMORE, Md., July 5 (AP)—Senator William E. Borah, who carried the mystery and glamour that surrounds him in official life to his hospital bed here.

The dynamic leader of progressive republicans and foremost internationalist in the senate, came to Johns Hopkins hospital a week ago for his annual physical examination. The test revealed the need of an operation for removal of the prostate gland.

No Hurry
"It can wait," said the examining surgeon. "There's no hurry."

"Do it now," Borah ordered. The major operation was performed immediately. The news was flashed throughout the nation and abroad, where, because of his former position as chairman of the powerful senate foreign relations committee, the Idaho republican's name is well known.

Since the surgery hospital officials have reported Borah to be "resting comfortably."

Fear Pneumonia
Mrs. Borah, however, told the United Press that her husband was "in danger" of pneumonia. She said that doctors had been fighting for days against an attack of pneumonia and symptoms of pneumonia.

"He has been sick to even glance at messages," Mrs. Borah said in denying that the senator was receiving visitors or reading no messages is that he is seeking upon his confinement as an opportunity for a rest cure.

A nurse reported Borah was "recovering like a text book case—without any setback."

"It is true," said Dr. Lewis, "that the senator has denied himself visitors and messages. It was his desire to make his recuperation period a rest cure as well as a recovery from the operation."

"There has been no cause for alarm."

OMAHA, July 4 (AP)—Mrs. Elizabeth Flynn, 28, burned herself and her five-month-old baby boy to death at their home today.

The baby was found dead on the basement floor and the mother died in a hospital.

As the story of the tragedy was reconstructed by her mother-in-law, Mrs. Alice Flynn, who lived with her, the younger woman took the baby, John Oliver, from her crib, placed him on the basement floor, poured gasoline over him and set him afire.

Her own clothing gasoline-soaked and flaming, she ran to the back yard. There the mother-in-law beat out the flames in her clothing. Taken into the house, the younger woman seized a butcher knife, which was taken from her before she could harm herself further. She was then taken to a hospital.
