YANKS DROP 2 TO SENATORS

Babe Ruth's Homer Not Enough to Defeat Leaders

By HUGH S. FULLERTON, Jr., Associated Press Sports Writer It seems to be an established fact that Babe Ruth and company still are baseball's best drawing cards.

The third largest crowd in baseball history, 77,345 fans, saw the Yanks try in vain to regain the lead from the Washington Senators yesterday.

Washington won the first game 6-5 in ten innings and the second 3-2 despite Babe Ruth's 13th homer as Walter Stewart pitched five-hit ball.

Only Two Larger The only larger baseball crowds on record were the 85,265 who saw the Yanks and the Athletics in September 1928 and the 89,284 who turned out for the opening of the Cleveland stadium last year.

The seventh place Boston Red Sox scored the only other American league double victory by walloping the Philadelphia Athletics 14 to 3 and 1 to 1.

The brilliant flinging of Ben Cantwell and Wally Berger's clouting enabled the Braves to make it a great day for Boston by winning twice from the New York Giants, National League leaders, 3-0 and 5-2.

Despite the two defeats, the Giants remained five games ahead of the St. Louis Cardinals, who divided with Pittsburgh. The cards won the morning game 5-1, while the Cardinals won the night hurling but the Cubs took the afternoon clash 4-2 as Larry French bested Jim Mooney in a snoutpaw duel.

PHILS WIN Twice The Phillies, National League tail-enders, pasted the Brooklyn Dodgers twice, 6-3 and 4-2 with a display of timely hitting featured by Chuck Klein's 17th homer.

Guy Bush and Allyn Stout displayed brilliant elbowing as the former hit for two runs and the Chicago Cubs a 4-0 opening victory over Cincinnati and the latter pitched the Reds to an 8-1 triumph.

Cleveland's Indians and the Chicago White Sox, battling for fourth in the American league, split even, 4-3 and 4-2, in their second clash after the Tigers had pounded out a 7-4 decision.

Bruce Campbell's tenth inning homer gave the St. Louis Browns a 6-4 victory over Detroit in their second clash after the Tigers had pounded out a 7-4 decision.

Dollar Loses On World Exchange

LONDON, July 5. (AP)—After a quiet and steady opening the American dollar encountered new pressure today, which continued to depress the exchange and it closed at its lowest, 45.52, or a net loss of 3 1/2 cents.

There was practically no support for American currency and much uncertainty prevailed because of the knowledge that a large bear position exists.

PARIS, July 5. (AP)—The American dollar closed on the Paris market today at 18.73 francs to the dollar (5.32 1/2 cents to the franc), down 47 centimes from yesterday's close.

Walter Hagen in Lead In British Open Meet Cards Five Under Par

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 5. (AP)—Walter Hagen, the American veteran who has won the British crown four times, today shot into the lead with a spectacular 68, five under par, for the first round of the British open golf championship.

Hagen was out in 32, four under par, and clipped another stroke off perfect figures over the incoming route of the "old" championship course. His total was only a stroke short of the course record set by William (Pat) Nolan, Irish pro, in the qualifying competition, and took the lead from Cyril J. H. Tolley, British amateur, who had a 70 for his first round.

The American Ryder Cup captain sank putts from all corners of the greens. His card included an Eagle 3 on the 530-yard fifth, where Hagen laid an iron 20 feet from the pin and holed the putt.

Hagen holed putts of nine feet for his birdies on the first and third holes. After scoring his Eagle on the fifth, duplicating a feat performed by Bob Jones in

winning the title in 1927, "Sir Walter" played par golf until he bagged another birdie on the famous road hole, the 17th, where many a title hope has been wrecked in previous years.

Six years ago Jones also shot a 68 for his first round over the St. Andrews course as the fore-runner to a victory with a total of 285, the record for the British open until Gene Sarazen clipped two strokes off it last year with 283.

Gene Four Behind Sarazen trailed Hagen today by four strokes, shooting a sub-par 72 that would have been much lower if the champion's putts for birdies had not consistently stuck on the lip of the cup.

Tolley's 70 and a 71 for Nolan, the medalist, were among the best scores for the first round. At 72, with Sarazen, were George T. Dunlap, Jr., New York amateur, and Archie Compston, British professional.

The champion of Wales was a spectator as Hagen finished his great round and was among the first to congratulate the American.

WIMBLEDON, England, July 5.—Ellsworth Vines Jr., defending Wimbledon champion, defeated his most formidable antagonist, Henri Cochet, the brilliant French player, today, 6-2, 3-6, 3-6, 6-1.

It was Vines' third straight victory over the former French ruler of the tennis courts.

The champion's forehead drive was working especially well, frequently going like a bullet to flick the dust at the corners for easy placements. One particularly passing shot down the sidelines in the seventh game of the first set caused Cochet to throw up his racket in amazement.
