MANY ARRESTED ON "GLORIOUS" FOURTH

Chas. H. Moore, charged with driving while intoxicated on East Main street Tuesday, asked additional time in which to enter a plea when arraigned before Justice of the Peace W. H. Barnes Wednesday morning. Moore is held in the county jail under bonds of \$200, which have not yet been raised, according to Barnes.

Olaf Westberg pleaded guilty Wednesday to charges of reckless driving on July Fourth, and was assessed a fine of \$25 and costs. Both Moore and Westberg were arrested by state police officers.

The case of the state vs. Ray "Fat" Lewis, charged with larceny, was dismissed Wednesday by order of the district attorney. Lewis was arrested June 15, and has been held in the county jail. John O'Neil was arrested July Fourth and is being held in the county jail for federal officers on charges of sale of intoxicating liquor.

Hessie Moss, Everett Lynch, Floyd Brown, Stonehill Hecote, Le Roy Hood, Willard Williams and Monroe Ball, all Klamath Indians, were brought to the county jail Tuesday night by reservation officers, and charged with drunkenness and disorderly conduct. The Indians will be taken to justice court of the Sprague river district within the next few days for arraignment and sentence.

Ralph Johnson, local taxi driver, arrested by city police Tuesday on a county warrant charging non-support, was released from custody Wednesday, and Louie Shaddock, arrested by city patrolmen on an open charge, was turned over to the county jail.
