CROP SITUATION IN NATION IMPROVED

WASHINGTON, July 6, (AP)—The weather bureau in its weekly crop review said today rains in many localities during the past week improved crop conditions, but that both small grains and corn in many sections still needed moisture badly with some sections of the cotton belt also unusually dry.

Winter grain crops in the northern great plains have continued to ripen prematurely but in the Pacific Northwest the weather was "very favorable" at a critical stage in growth, the bureau said.
