land and Holland—from the necessity of a decision on their currency stabilization policy or the withdrawal from the conference, and permitted the parley to continue.

England Submits Plan
Despite the ostensible refusal of the gold bloc to participate in monetary deliberations unless stabilization was studied immediately, it was generally believed that delegates would be drawn irresistibly into financial talks which undoubtedly will occur within the orbit of the economic discussions.

It was most noteworthy that the French receded from their earlier insistence that tariffs and import quotas should be excluded from the deliberations if stabilization is put to one side. The actual vote of the steering committee in deciding to continue the parley came on a resolution submitted by Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald. The committee met at 6:10 p. m., adopted the resolution in 10 minutes and adjourned.

Blame Removed
Secretary of State Cordell Hull shared honors with President Roosevelt tonight as the "great conciliator" after rescuing the conference by a dramatic appeal for the welfare of the world. Although realists here do not expect marvels from the revived parley, they applauded Hull's success.

By a skillful maneuver, the secretary removed his own failure of the parley from the United States. It was felt. He was able to do so following Mr. Roosevelt's message yesterday, which was firm but more conciliatory in tone than his rejection of the gold bloc currency proposals last Monday.

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Nash, Bailey, Underhill and Miller were all connected with the same gang. Crimes charged against them include a bank robbery at Fort Scott, Kan., for which Bailey was sentenced to prison, and the \$2,000,000 hold-up of a bank at Lincoln, Neb.

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"Vacation Earned"
"One item in the resolution concerned three members of my office being at National Guard camp during June and drawing pay from the county at the same time. I feel that any person who has been as loyal as these three employees have been not only to myself but to Klamath county during the time that they have been employed would be entitled to a vacation of two weeks on pay, particularly where the pay in one instance was \$15 per month from Klamath county, another \$108 per month and another \$165 per month. I do not believe that any same individual would consider this extravagant.

"I regret very much that a matter of this kind should come up in the way it has. I mean by that that personalities are a basis of political discord are very unhealthy for a community and most certainly are not conducive to efficient operation of such an office as mine and, most certainly, it is not in the interest of the taxpayers to necessitate another special election at an expense of not less than \$3,000 to gratify the personal desires of disgruntled attorneys."

The law provides that in order to bring about a recall election, petitions must contain signatures amounting to 25 per cent of the number of electors who voted for supreme court justice at the preceding general election. The vote cast for Justice J. O. Bailey in Klamath county was 3,065, so that recall petitions would have to contain 2,016 names.

The resolution adopted by the Taxpayers League reads: "Be it resolved, that whereas, T. R. Gillenwaters, district attorney for Klamath county, Oregon, has during his term of office maintained said office in the highest degree of financial

extravagance to the taxpaying public of Klamath county, Oregon, to the exclusion of good and conservative business management; and,

"Whereas, said district attorney has throughout said term of office maintained a corps of high-salaried clerks and deputies to the financial embarrassment of said taxpaying public of Klamath county; and,

"Whereas, said office could be maintained efficiently with much less clerk and legal talent by said district attorney giving his undivided attention to the duties of said district attorney's office, by said district attorney abandoning his private practice in the Weed-Klamath building, wherein he maintains a private office at the expense of said taxpayers of said Klamath county; and,

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"Whereas, said district attorney's expense salary account for the month of June, 1938, including his own, is in the aggregate of \$719.58, while during said month there were three members of his number employed in his said office absent from Klamath county, Oregon, for a period of from 15 to 17 days, and while absent were each drawing pay as national guardsmen of the state of Oregon in the military service of said state of Oregon, without any account being made by said district attorney, T. R. Gillenwaters, to Klamath county, Oregon, for and on account of said absence;

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
